Celebrations at Horning

The Scouts spent their summer camp at Northrepps, near Cromer in Norfolk at the beginning of the school summer holidays. This is a favourite site for the Troop as they are allowed to swim in the owner's heated outdoor swimming pool besides visiting to the beach at Mundesley, trekking across the fens and spending a day cruising on the River Bure at Horning, courtesy of Peter and Barbara Foster.

This is normal for the Troop but what is not normal is that this was the 40th consecutive summer camp that Jeremy had attended, both as boy and leader, and something that Audrey and I thought was worth celebrating. So on the morning of the Horning outing, Audrey, Andrew and I landed unexpectedly on Peter and Barbara's doorstep complete with a celebration cake. We were royally entertained to lunch whilst waiting for the cruisers to return.

When the crew arrived back, we were able to surprise Jeremy with congratulations on this remarkable record and for everyone present to have a slice of the cake with their tea. It is worth noting that on occasions in the past the Troop would not have had a camp had it not been for Jerry so we also owe him a great debt of thanks.

SAINT BENET'S ABBEY

Situated on the banks of the river Bure close to Ant mouth, St Benet's Abbey is something of a landmark on the Norfolk Broads. However, the most visible feature is not actually part of the original Abbey. In the 18th century a wind powered drainage mill was constructed using the remains of the Abbey gatehouse as part of the structure. This has created a strange fusion of architectural styles with an 18th century brick mill tower rising up through the medieval stone and flint gatehouse.

St Benet's Abbey was founded in 1020 AD as a monastery for Benedictine monks, however there is evidence for an even earlier Christian presence on the site. St Benet's is believed to have been established on land forming part of the royal estate of King Canute. Certainly he was one of the fifteen listed early benefactors.

Today, apart from the gatehouse and mill, St Benet's is little more than a series of low flint walls and a collection of mounds and hollows in the earth. After the Abbey ceased to function the site quickly became derelict and most of the building materials were reused to build local villages - such as Horning. However, if the size and detail of the gatehouse is used as a benchmark, the Abbey buildings must have been very impressive. The site covered 38 acres and was surrounded by a stone wall and protective ditch which can still be traced. The Abbey community was virtually self sufficient and with the aid of a guide book it is possible to understand the part each mound and hollow played in the life of the Abbey. There are fishponds, swan pits (the monks had a royal privilege to eat swan), the boat dock and its wharves, the vegetable gardens and various buildings.

The monastic community was swept away under Henry VIII's closure of the monasteries in the 1530's. Uniquely, St Benet's was never actually "dissolved" and the site came under the authority of the Bishops of Norwich. The land remains consecrated ground and on the site of the original high altar a cross of oak sourced from the Sandringham estate has been erected. Every year on the first Sunday in August, the Bishop of Norwich conducts an open air service around this cross.

Despite our long association with the area, I had never attended this service. So this year, Diane and I together with Matthew and Louise took the boat down river to St Benet's Abbey and attended the open air service. Like us, many people came by boat, whilst others walked or drove along the rough farm track that is normally closed to vehicles. The Bishop himself arrived by wherry (a traditional Norfolk Broads sailing barge) and I have a photo of the Bishop standing on the front of the wherry with his gown flying in the breeze with one hand holding his crook and the other holding on to his mitre! It was a memorable occasion with some 300 people in the congregation. Given the association with the river I felt that the opening hymn "Love is flowing like a river..." was most apt. The service closed with the Prayer of St Benedict:

"O gracious and holy Father, give us wisdom to perceive you, diligence to seek you, patience to wait for you, eyes to behold you, a heart to meditate upon you, and a life to proclaim you, through the power of the spirit of Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen"

Mary's predictions of a rise in violence were not mentioned. The sexual revolution which took place in the 1960's was almost ignored. The "Viewers & Listeners Association" or VALA, has continued to the present day. A few years ago the name 'mediawatch – UK' was given so that all means of communication could be included.

Mary is still a controversial figure, almost a decade after her death and forty years after the initial campaign. I am very grateful to the BBC for making and showing the programme. Each time I phone the BBC on 03700 100 222 to comment on a programme, I am impressed by the efficiency and courtesy of the staff. Gone are the days of being told to: "Just switch off".
