#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR MINISTER.

We will save all the reminiscing till the farewell do.

I have always been confident about The Drive's future and remain so. I am sure Rev Bernadino Mandlate is the right person to be The Drive's minister and he will add his range of gifts to those of the congregation and together it will be a great team. Church ministry is about working together as a team and each member of the congregation has a significant part in that team. There are those who labour tirelessly throughout the year to whom we owe much thanks for all they do, there are of course many but I want to particularly pay tribute to those who oversee the property, lettings and finance.

A common cry in churches is that nobody wants to teke up responsibility for doing the jobs that need doing. At the Drive I marvel at all the duty rotas there are. Over the years I have often said that The Drive needs to see itself as a church that isn't just for the local neighbourhood but for a much wider area. In fact this is already the case with many of our congregation living more than two miles away. We need to reflect upon this and ensure that those on the edges of our community are constantly included.

I am delighted that the church buildings are extensively used and that we are developing community around our premises' users. I know Bernadino will want to develop this further. What we mustn't lose sight of though is the church's mission to the wider society and world. Our uniformed organisations and the JMA collecting are good examples of such but to involve everyone then the Aquabox filling we did a couple of years ago is the type of mission activity we might usefully do again. We need tentacles of mission into the world or we just become a holy huddle.

When we return to take the Church Anniversary in a few years time (of maybe we won't get an invite!) I look forward to seeing how the church has continued to prosper and grow and I am sure we will always be keeping in touch with what is going on in one way or another.


