Church Repairs

It has been decided that services should be held in the Hall rather than the Parlour so that Junior Church and Creche can use adjacent rooms rather than having to move to another building.

All possible help is requested for 10 am on Saturday 5th February to clear the church and move items needed to the Hall. There will be another call for volunteers to clean and put everything back when the work has been completed.

Please note that for safety reasons there will be no access to the church once the work has started.

A SIGN ON A CHURCH

Feeling down in the mouth?

Come in for a faith lift.

Meet the congregation Stan Singleton's Story, so far....

I was born at 15 Stanley Road, Ilford on 6^{th} December 1920 – just 90 years ago. I was the third son, following Bill and Les who were 10 and 8 years older than me. No doubt my mother was hoping for a girl, but alas, she got me!

By the time I arrived, my father was a Constable in the Metropolitan Police but continued service earned him promotion to Sergeant and then Inspector. As a result, we moved to police accommodation in Walthamstow and then Bow, each for 5 years. When Dad retired in 1931 we moved to the house he bought in Redbridge Lane, which became our home until Mum's death in 1969 and Dad's death in 1970.

After school, I was employed in the electrical industry and my girl friend, Olive, lived opposite my house. All seemed set for steady progress towards marriage, parenthood and grand-parenthood, in succession of course, until retirement. However this happy forecast was interrupted in September 1939 by the start of the Second World War. I was nearing the end of an electrical engineering course and on completing it in July 1941, was conscripted into the Royal Air Force. Twelve months later, I was given provisional warning for overseas service, which somewhat hastened my marriage plans. Accordingly my wedding took place on 19th September 1942 and on the following day, Olive and I travelled to Bournemouth for a seven day honeymoon. However, within two hours of reaching our hotel, a telegram arrived with the directive "return to unit immediately". We, of course, assumed that my overseas posting had been issued and travelled back to London and thence to RAF Station Bradwell Bay on the Essex Coast with no further information. On arrival at base, I learned the recall was in fact an application deadline for a Commission that I had applied for. Deadline now met and we were able to return to our honeymoon three days later.

My first overseas posting was to Sierra Leone in 1944 as Flying Officer, Engineer Branch, responsible for the repair of aircraft electrical and instrument equipment. This appointment was unaccompanied and ended in 1945 after 12 months. However, in July 1951, I was posted as Flight Lieutenant to Singapore for 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ years and this time accompanied so was delighted to have Olive, Frances and Ruth with me.

My next spell overseas was in August 1964 to Labuan Island, off the coast of Borneo for 12 months unaccompanied. This tour was shorter than usual because of the Indonesian emergency. However, during this posting, I was promoted from Squadron Leader to Wing Commander.

During my RAF service, Olive and I decided that two of the most common courses of action for service personnel was not acceptable to us i.e. to move children every 2 ½ years with my postings or to put them into boarding school. Therefore, we purchased a house where Olive and the children (Frances and Ruth now having been joined by Rosalind) lived close by my parents and, except for overseas trips; I was able to get home every weekend. That house was in Grangeway Gardens and it is still my home.

I have been blessed with excellent health and good fortune during my whole life. My eldest brother, Bill, was injured and taken prisoner of war for most of the conflict and my other brother, Les, suffered severe ill health whilst serving in the Army, finally being invalided from National Service in 1942. I survived my wartime service unscathed and on being granted a Permanent Commission in the RAF, continued serving until 1975 when I retired at the compulsory age of 55 after 34 years. I had a heart valve replacement in 1994 and colon cancer in 2006, both of which I am pleased to say have caused me no problems due to early detection.

Olive's and my decision to buy our own home all those years ago when all my RAF colleagues were living in married quarters proved most fortuitous as my house was paid for by the time I retired whereas former colleagues where having to work to pay a mortgage. Therefore, at 55, I was fit, financially comfortable and keen volunteer my services wherever it might help. Being a committed mason for many years, I offered my services to the

Essex Provincial Grand Lodge and for the next 18 years occupied the position of Secretary of the Loughton Masonic Hall Company, which provided the necessary facilities for 58 Masonic organisations including 34 Craft Lodges which I found most satisfying period.

However, by about 1995, my domestic commitments had dramatically increased due to my wife's health problems (Parkinsons Disease, Diabetes and ultimately Cancer) that she coped with magnificently and with the utmost dignity. Alas, she lost her fight in November 1997 and I feel privileged to have shared 55 years of happy marriage which such a special lady.

Having just celebrated my 90th birthday, I am delighted to still be able to travel and thoroughly enjoyed visiting Australia, Tasmania and Hong Kong earlier this year and hope to have more exciting trips to look forward to in the future. Stan.

JAKE STAINES 1989 - 2010

You may not recall the name Jake Staines, but I am sure you will recall Dinner with Decajazz at The Drive in 2007. The connection is that Jake was the Band's very talented drummer and member of the Barber Shop quartet. Jake and Matthew were close friends from their time at Coopers Co & Coborn School, their mutual support of West Ham and in more recent years as members of Decajazz. Tragically, Jake was killed in a motor accident just before Christmas.

On Thursday 6 January Matthew, Diane and I attended Jake's funeral and celebration of his life. The funeral was held at City of London Crematorium and whilst not intended as a religious service it was one of the most meaningful funerals I can recall.

Jake was a highly talented musician. He composed, sang, played piano, saxophone and of course the drums. During the service there was no congregational singing, but we heard recordings of Jake accompanying his younger brother singing "Only My Love is Blind"

composed by Jake. Matthew read a tribute to his friend and we then heard "Me and My Shadow" sung by Jake and his father Bob. Later we heard "All the Kings Horses" composed and sung by Jake's sister which contained some very poignant lyrics. At the close, we heard the drum roll section of "Anvil Chorus" played by Jake and recorded by me at the Decajazz concert at The Drive. I never imagined that my recording would be used at the celebration of Jake's life.

At the end of the service we were given a CD of eight songs recorded by Jake. Whilst the tragedy of Jake's death is undiminished, the CD and our memories of Jake will live long. Jeremy
