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Handwritten Bible Project

Do you suffer from writer's cramp? If you do, this is not for you! Extract from "The Handwritten Bible Project" by Jenny Ellis.

As part of our Methodist celebration of the 400th Anniversary of the King James Bible and the Biblefresh initiative, Conference 2010 resolved that the

Districts would work collectively to handwrite the Bible during the course of

2011. This will be done using re-cycled paper, and with encouragement to express maximum creativity, and cultural diversity to create a 'Bible of the People'.

"The hand transcription will take place in the Districts, Diaconal Order, Connexional Team and Methodist Recorder between January and the end of May 2011 (5 months) during the first half of the Methodist Year of the Bible.

Each District etc, will present their handwritten sheets in an act of worship at Conference 2011. The approximate 8000 sheets will then be bound in the summer of 2011 into a number of hard bound volumes, which will be displayed, celebrated and used in various ways throughout the connexion."

MEET THE CONGREGATION BRIAN GRINHAM

In 1930 my parents, who had previously lived in Seven Kings, moved to 9 Lincoln Gardens with my Maternal Grandmother and my two sisters – I did not arrive until 1934. I am not sure why, but they went to Eastern Avenue Church although Cranbrook Park would have been nearer. It may be that as Revd Ashby Howe was

minister for a while, and he had been their minister in Seven Kings, that they decided on Eastern Avenue.

I was brought to Church as a baby and have been coming now for 76 years, so I guess that makes me one of the longest serving (you notice that I didn't say oldest) members. Having gone through the Sunday School from infants to seniors and then helping out in the office before becoming a teacher in the Junior Department, I was received into membership about the age

of 17. In those days Mr Ernie Evans led the Junior Department, and we had 10 classes of about 10 in each class!

Having left School after taking my School Leaving Certificate at the age of 16, I got a job at Westminster Bank and started at Ilford Broadway branch. I was with the Bank during the merger with National Provincial and then Royal Bank of Scotland, until I was offered early retirement at the age of $54 \frac{1}{2}$.

Most of the time I served in local branches apart from one spell of about 4 years in Cheapside.

At the age of 18 I was called up to do my National Service, which was delayed for a time due to appendicitis. I was accepted for the R.A.F. and spent most of my two years at Hendon aerodrome, where I served as an air wireless mechanic, servicing the radios installed in the aircraft. This involved a certain amount of flying when the pilot wanted to test the radio that had just been repaired or retuned. Great fun – especially when one of the sergeant pilots wanted to do some aerobatics and let me fly the plane for a while! I was demobbed in August 1954 having got nearer home with each posting and sometimes coming home in the evening to play badminton or at a weekend to play tennis on the church courts – now Whitfield Court.

Of course, at that age girls played a part in my life, and eventually I asked Pat if she would like to go out with me – she was also a teacher in the Junior Department and Tawny Owl in the Brownie Pack run by my sister Jean. I don't know whether it had any effect

on our eventual marriage, but I actually asked Pat out for the first time in Church almost in front of the pulpit!

We got married on 6th September 1958 and went to Guernsey for our honeymoon. It was not a particularly good start to our married life as there had been a very big storm the night before our wedding – the actual day was glorious – which had disrupted rail travel in the south east of England.

We had booked the first night at The Strand Palace Hotel, which was very crowded with people being unable to travel home, and the service at breakfast time, and checking out, was terrible. We caught the train to Gatwick that should have got us there in time (although we had planned to get an earlier one), but arrived too late for our flight, which meant a four-hour wait before they could fit us on another flight. Pat had not flown before and it was a bit bumpy until we got over the coast, when the cloud disappeared and Pat eventually opened her eyes! There was me telling her that she probably would not feel the landing because the pilots were so good – I did not know that Guernsey still had a grass runway!

We had planned a fortnights honeymoon, but unfortunately had to come home after one week as Pat's Father had died. We went back to Guernsey the next year and finished our honeymoon!

In 1961 we moved to Highcliffe Gardens, having started married life in a maisonette opposite Gants Hill Church. Our eldest daughter, Susan, was born in 1963 –on the same day and in the same hospital as Andrew Taylor (Andrew is about 12 hours older) – with Janet and Mary following in 1966 and 1967. Peter, our son, was not born until 1978 and seemed to have 3 mothers with Janet and Mary only too pleased to change nappies, play, bath and generally look after him. Susan, who was studying for her GCSEs, was not so impressed as she wanted quiet for her studies and, of course, Peter was not particularly quiet sometimes. I am pleased to say that they are all best friends now.

We went through a very agonizing time when Pat was diagnosed with cancer in 2004 and, although she was very up beat about her

treatment, she went into depression after her chemotherapy was cut short by one treatment, because her kidneys were showing signs of stress, and lost her fight at the end of 2005. She is still greatly missed by all the family and I have had to get used to living alone and looking after myself. I could not have asked for a better or more loving wife for the 47 years of our marriage, and am eternally grateful for her love and support during our time together.

The one thing I am sure of is that it would have been a struggle to cope without my faith and the support of all the Church family here at The Drive.

Small Choirs' Festival 2011

When we went to the Small Choirs' Festival 2009, I asked the organiser, Philip Norman, if he was looking for a venue for 2010. He told me that was already organised, but could we host the 2011 festival? After a couple of emails, the date was in the diary – then quietly put on the back burner.

Suddenly it was nearly two years later and more emails began to fly around as the date drew nearer. In reality, most of the organising was done by Philip, but there were still details to sort out, mainly hospitality. And then January $30^{\rm th}$ arrived and so did around 70 singers from churches in East London and Essex.

The festival is designed for church choirs with few or no men, so all the music is arranged in three parts (soprano, alto, bass) instead of the traditional four (which include tenor). This time the music ranged from the 17th century to the present day, and included pieces suitable for use at different times in the church year, which means that you are likely to hear several of the pieces again at some stage! Therein lies the beauty of this festival – the music is accessible and reusable, and coming together with so many other singers gives everyone a boost of confidence as well as celebrating the service that church musicians continue to give each week in their own places of worship. For our part, we were delighted to be joined in our rehearsals for the festival by singers from Ilford Methodist Church.


The organ was played by Glynne Williams, a co-founder of the festival. The third co-founder, Chris Stevenson, died last year, and Philip gave an eloquent tribute to Chris during the service.

There is not usually a large congregation for these festivals, but Philip noted in his thanks to us our efforts to persuade people to come and listen. There was a good sized congregation present, including many from the Drive, and they were able to join in lustily with the hymns. Thanks in particular to Jeremy Foster and Susan Ruckes amongst others for encouraging people to lend their support.

Thanks also to Catherine Sayers, Audrey Taylor and the team of tea-makers who provided the choir with refreshments between the rehearsal and the service, and to Bernardino, who led us through the service and gave a short address which went down very well with everyone present.

Next year's festival is a bit of a departure, being on a Saturday afternoon and in central London – Saturday 4th February at Bloomsbury Central Baptist Church. Keep an eye out for more details!
