

Since her failing health she has not been able to carry on with most of these roles, and it is, as a Church, we thank God for Audrey's dedication to all the tasks she undertook.

On a personal note, I would like to thank Audrey for the friendship we have had. Some fifteen years ago, after Bert had died, Pat used to take Audrey to Sainsburys each week to do the shopping. I could never understand how it could take up to 4 hours. When Pat became unwell I started taking them both and then I understood – maybe an hour and a half to do the shopping, stopping from time to time for a chat with other shoppers, and then into the café for a coffee (or two) and more chat!

GIFT AID

Towards the end of 2012 The Church Council appointed me as Gift Aid Secretary for the Church, as Frank Sayers was unable to continue because the Methodist Church, through whom he used to claim the refunds on members donated gifts, required them to be submitted via the internet, which Frank did not have.

At that time we decided to claim direct from the Inland Revenue, which, we understood, would speed up the receipt of our refunds, and save us the charge of £1.50 per claimant levied by the Methodist Church for handling the claim. Unfortunately it has taken a long time to get the system set up, but we are now in a position to claim for the last two tax years in the very near future.

Any records of the actual declarations people had signed are not immediately available, and in order to update our records and have them available, should the Revenue require to see them, I shall be asking all those who have signed a declaration to sign a new up-to-date one to keep within our control.

This will, of course, also be an opportunity for anyone else who does not at the moment gift aid their donations to do so if they wish. It

does not cost you anything and, providing you are a taxpayer, the Church can claim back 25 pence for every pound you contribute, from the Inland Revenue.

I will be contacting all our present contributors over the next few weeks, and if you want to join the ranks of our Gift Aiders, please see me.
