

Friends

It is amazing how time runs fast. It's either because we are grown ups and think of when time was slower, the pace of life was slower and these days everything is fast. We are forever adjusting to the pace of life, struggling to catch up with others. And time flies.

John Wesley, in his wisdom, instituted the class meetings which helped many to know the teachings of Jesus, because they had space and time to learn, teach and discuss their understanding of what Jesus taught and what He expects from each of us.

We are followers of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. We need/must take time to read the Gospels and try to understand what is it that Jesus taught and how does He expects us to pass on the teachings, and how can we be truthful to Jesus despite our misgivings. We are called to follow Christ and to teach about Jesus.

Take time this Lent to ponder and reflect on your understanding of the gospels and your expectations on your personal relationship with God through what the humanity of Jesus May mean to you. God's blessing to each and everyone of you.
