OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

It is amazing how quickly time passes as it is now that time of year when we, as a church, start filling shoe boxes for the above charity.

We had a wonderful response last year, and with the help of the Pre-School parents, were able to take over 70 boxes to the collection point.

I wonder if we can beat that number this year. The boxes will be available in Church on the first Sunday in October together with the leaflets with instructions for what can be put in the boxes. If you can help, please take a box or two, plus one leaflet for each box, as they contain a label to indicate the age and gender of the child for whom it is suitable. You are asked to include a donation of £3 towards shipping costs. This can be made, as you will see in the leaflet, on line and you will be able to print a bar code which, if enclosed at the top of the box, will enable you to be told to which country your shoe box gets sent.

The filled boxes have to be delivered to the collection point in early November, so can we please have them back by the end of October. The total boxes from the U.K. last year totalled over 800,000.

The Bible Summary of the book club: The book of James

During the first meeting the book of James was discussed. Each person in the group was given the opportunity to state their opinion on whether the book was a good read.

Particular points that were discussed were James' approach to suffering as he wrote in James 1:2 NLT "when troubles of any kind come your way, consider it an opportunity for great joy". The practical implications of this were that it is in suffering that character is developed. Also, the power of the tongue as the analogy of a spark starting a fire was used to illustrate the power of tongue in chapter 2.

Useful questions during the discussion were:

What is the historical context? Why was it written? How is it relevant today? How is it relevant to your life? Any memorable points or verses?

For the meeting in October the Book of Jude will be discussed. For November the book of Mark will be looked at.



Circuit Meeting

The Circuit Meeting held on 15th November was attended by about 40 representatives from the 10 churches.

Collins Frimpong, who led the service in our church in March has asked to be considered for training as a minister. He spoke about his calling and was supported by Rev Jan Atkins and Rev Ermal Kirby who spoke of their confidence in his potential. The meeting agreed unanimously.

Much of the meeting was spent talking about the Work of God. The Circuit Consultation on Vision and Priorities had emphasized:



We are here for a purpose and we are on a journey.

Other points raised and reported:

- Rev Jan Atkins is now part-time. Armstrong Gibbs will be helping at Grange Hill.
- There is a vacancy for Circuit Steward.
- The police have given advice about security at church meetings and an advice sheet has been issued by the Methodist Property Department.
- Members were invited to share concerns for the circuit and its churches through prayer, either individual or group, on the last Wednesday of each month.

Two circuit events were announced:

- Saturday 22nd October 10.00 1.00 at The Drive a study of homelessness introduced by staff from Redbridge night shelter.
- Sunday 27th November 4 pm at Gants Hill Circuit Advent Celebration to which all churches are invited to contribute.
