

We are entering the Lent season soon. In truth by the time this newsletter is out, it will be Lent. We are gearing up to the preparations for Good Friday and Easter. Sometimes the scriptures challenge us to move on and to reflect on our lifestyles so that we are ready to be as Christ in the way we see and interact with the world around us.

Small Choirs Festival

On Saturday 4th February, a small group from our choir and some singers from Ilford Methodist Church travelled to All Saint's Church, Margaret Street in the West End to take part in this year's Small Choirs Festival.

Run by Phillip Norman, the festival has been going since 2004 and gives church choirs with few or no men the opportunity to come together to sing specially arranged music as part of a larger group.

This year the music ranged from the 16^{th} century to the present day, and included a reminder that 2017 is the 500^{th} anniversary of the Reformation with the singing of Martin Luther's great hymn "A Safe Stronghold".

There was a thoughtful homily from Father John Burniston, parish priest of St James', Islington, himself a life-long church musician. The number of singers was a little lower than previous years, but it was still a privilege and joy to sing in such wonderful (if a little chilly!) surroundings.

SINGING THE FAITH – THE FIFTH YEAR BE STILL, FOR TO GOD BE THE GLORY HAS TWO NEW FRIENDS...

We first used the new Methodist hymnal *Singing the Faith* on Sunday 15th January 2012. Since then I have kept a note of the hymns and songs used (from now on, I'll just refer to them as "songs"), and for those of you interested in statistics, here is a summary of those we used in 2016.

Not included in these figures are the handful of songs chosen by preachers that are not in *StF*, and any songs the choir has sung alone.

Over the year we sang 164 different songs from *StF*, which is 17 fewer than were used in 2015, and actually the smallest number of different songs we have used in one year since we started using *StF*. These were the most frequently used songs:

A further 8 songs were chosen 3 times, 36 twice and the remaining 103 just once.

Of the total 164 songs used, 14 were completely new to us. This brings the total of new songs we have used since the introduction of *StF* to over 100.

For the first time, we have 3 songs sharing the top slot. 94 *To God be the glory* is there for the fourth year running! It remains the only song to appear in the most frequently used list in all the five years we have been using *StF*. 20 *Be still* returns to number one for the first time since 2012 and 531 *What a friend* is at the top for the first time.

Taking the five years we have been using *StF* overall, we have now used 372 of the 790 songs available (not including the Canticles and Psalms section) which is forty-seven percent of the book covered – still just short of that elusive fifty percent!

The top two hymns in those five years remains unchanged from last year:

32 times 94 To God be the glory, great things he has

done

22 times 20 Be still, for the presence of the Lord

It's interesting to note some of the songs which used to be popular but have not been used at all since introducing *StF*, among them 73 *Fill thou my life*, 312 *The head that once was crowned with thorns*, 368 *When morning gilds the skies*, 455 *All my hope on God is founded* and 748 *Glorious things of thee are spoken*.

The Gladstone Connection

Does anyone remember Revd. Charles Gladstone when he was the minister of Goodmayes Methodist Church?

When he retired, he and his wife moved to Reigate, Surrey, where they attended Reigate Methodist Church. My parents attended the same church from 1965 to 1981, when they moved to Clacton.

On Sunday 5th February, the Gladstone's son-in-law, Allan Ramsdon preached at The Drive after a long absence.

While working in Toronto French School, Canada, I lived for a year near St Clair Avenue and attended York Minster Park Baptist Church, where the minister was Dr. John Gladstone who was the Rev'd Charles Gladstone's nephew.

One thing I missed most on my return to England, was singing in the church choir. As well as the usual anthems each Sunday, works such as the Faure requiem and the Mozart requiem were performed on palm Sunday. I had practiced Mozart's Coronation mass for Palm Sunday 1978 but did not take part as I was on holiday in Hawaii. I had to wait about twenty years to sing that particular work with Ilford Choral Society, which I joined in 1979.
