#### Dear Friends

Greetings to all of you in the precious name of our Lord Jesus Christ. We have been wondering for sometime now about possibilities of getting a new minister to replace Ermal in the circuit. It has happened. We were given a minister, by direct stationing, who will be in pastoral charge of The Drive, Barkingside and Seven Kings from 1st September. As a result, I will be taking pastoral charge of Barking Methodist church and Ilford. I am not leaving the circuit as some may have thought. I will be much around and hope to continue to see all of you in my travels.

This appointment does not answer our serious questions about the future yet. It is likely that Revd Angela will not extend her time in the circuit. This means that immediately we need to start applying for her replacement and we expect the same difficulties in getting a replacement. There are circuits in worse situations than our and soon we may not be able to have four presbyters. We still need to think creatively about the future.



Roy is stepping down from being senior steward for a good number of years. Brian Taylor is stepping down from lettings and Liz Amah is stepping down from Communion stewardship. We will continue to use their knowledge of how things work and may they enjoy the deserved rest. We'll miss your commitment and availability to get on with it. May the Lord bless you.

## Redbridge Faith Forum – Rough Sleepers and the Homeless in Redbridge 29<sup>th</sup> January

There were several excellent speakers at this lunch time meeting of the Redbridge Faith Forum at Redbridge Central Library.

There were two ways suggested for us to help with this problem. Firstly we were asked to support the organisations which have expertise in working with the rough sleepers – the Salvation Army, The Welcome Centre and others. Secondly we were asked to call a number to report any homeless who may not be known about. We were told do not give them food, drink or cash in the street because this will encourage them to stay there.

#### **Further tributes to John Taylor**

In February 1959 I joined the Cub pack at the Drive. Audrey was the leader and John, her fiancé, was Assistant Scout Master, helping to run the Scout section. A few months later I was privileged to take part in a guard-of-honour with other Cubs and Scouts outside the Eastern Avenue door of the church as they came out after their wedding.

The fact that 60 years later, I am still with the Scouts at the Drive is due in no small measure to John. His enthusiasm, knowledge (and patience!) in teaching not just the 'HOWs' but also the 'WHYs' of core Scouting skills such as mapping, navigation, rope craft etc. clearly inspired me and is something I always tried to emulate when later as Scout Leader I was helping to train the next generation of Scouts.

My own career in Scouting has closely followed John's – as Assistant Scout Leader, Scout Leader and now as Group Scout Leader. He has been my mentor throughout and it has been a comfort knowing that whenever I was in need of support, John's experience was available to draw on and he would always be ready to step in with sound words of advice or practical help. I'll miss that.

I'll miss him too as a friend. Times spent round the fire at Scout camp laughing at his amusing stories of his life in Scouting, the RAF and the Civil Service. Many happy hours spent helping him service and repair some of the old cars he'd owned over the years and more recently, helping to recover seemingly lost data from his computer 'crashes'! Sometimes challenging but always fun!

Over the years, many hundreds of young people have passed through the 14<sup>th</sup> Ilford Scout Group. Most will have met John. Many, like me, will have been influenced and inspired by him, but every one of them will have their own reason to be grateful to John for his life and dedication to Scouting.

My first encounter with John was in 1968 when I was 12 years old. We were at Scout camp near Cobham in Surrey. My patrol was on duty in the kitchen and John was supervising. I was wearing my favourite blue denim style shirt, but as it was a hot day I had left it loose and unbuttoned. I was told to stir the stew and to make sure it did not stick. I suddenly felt rather hot and looking down I was horrified to see that my shirt was well and truly on fire. A moment later a bucket of cold water cascaded over me – John had come to the rescue.

The following year I managed to tread on a nail which punctured my plimsole and my foot! John was our First Aider and he tended to the wound and then took me to hospital for a tetanus jab. And the following year I remember having an upset tummy. John convinced me that the best cure was to eat a raw egg, assuring me "it will bind everything together".

John supported me when I became a young leader with the cubs and as a mentor when I became an Assistant Scout Leader. In his official capacities as Scout Leader, Group Scout Leader, Group Manager and finally Group Chairman John was a consistent and reliable presence. But John was also a friend. Some of the best times were at camp sitting round the camp fire in the evening eating fried egg sandwiches (if Audrey didn't see) when John would re tell some of his many stories. He was a great raconteur with stories about his early days in

Scouting and his National Service. The stories may have been a little embellished, but they were always amusing.

Diane and I were delighted when John agreed to be a Sponsor at Matthew's christening and both John and Audrey have been wonderful god parents taking a keen interest in his progress.

The many people who attended to John's funeral was testament to the many roles and activities in which he was involved, but was also confirmation of their affection for him.

I was privileged to know John both as a fellow Scouter and a friend.

#### **Philemon**

It is only 25 verses long and it's about a slave of Philemon's called Onesimus (which means useful) who had run away, perhaps because he was incompetent or dishonest, and had somehow ended up in Rome where Paul was being held prisoner. He was converted by the apostle and became so useful to Paul that he didn't want to part with him, but he asked Philemon to forgive him, take him back and treat him like a brother.

That's all there is to it really but the group found real treasure in those few verses for they're a sort of guide to living the Christian life. Their lively discussion would probably have gone on indefinitely if Jan and John hadn't quietly done their famous disappearing act and returned bearing cuppas and goodies the way they always do.

## Singing The Faith – The Seventh Year The Seven Year Itch?

We first used the new Methodist hymnal Singing the Faith on Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> January 2012. Since then I have kept a note of the hymns and songs used (from now on, I'll just refer to them as "songs"), and for those of you interested in statistics, here is a summary of those we used in 2018.

Not included in these figures are the 13 songs chosen by preachers that are not in StF, and any songs the choir has sung alone.

Over the year we sang 155 different songs from StF, which is 4 fewer than were used in 2017, and the smallest number of different songs we have used in one year since we started using StF. These were the most frequently used songs:

<u>5 times</u>	20 94	Be still, for the presence of the Lord To God be the glory, great things he has done!
	362	Meekness and majesty, manhood and deity
	395	Spirit of the Living God
4 times	59	Lord, the light of your love is shining
	79	I'll praise my Maker while I've breath
	465	Guide me, O thou great Jehovah
	470	Lord, for the years your love has kept and guided
	499	Great God, your love has called us here
	611	Brother, sister, let me serve you
	662	Have you heard God's voice
	663	I, the Lord of sea and sky, I have heard
	563	my people cry O Jesus, I have promised to serve you to the end

A further 15 songs were chosen 3 times, 32 twice and the remaining 95 just once. Of the total 155 songs used, 13 were completely new to us. One of those new songs, 662 *Have you heard God's voice*, was used 4 times in its first year.

A more even spread in 2018, with 4 songs sharing the top slot. Some songs remain constant choices year on year – 30 have been used at least once every year. Surprisingly, some "blockbusters" have wildly fluctuating fortunes - 503 *Love* 

*Divine*, not sung at all in 2016 and then chosen 7 times in 2017, made only one appearance in 2018.

Taking the seven years we have been using *StF* overall, we have now used 416 of the 790 songs available (not inluding the Canticles and Psalms section), which works out at 53 percent. We're beginning to make inroads into the half of the book that we have not yet used.

The top two hymns in those seven years remains unchanged from last year:

40 times 94 To God be the glory, great things he has

35 times 20 Be still, for the presence of the Lord

So 94 To God be the glory is hanging on to its top slot. Will it ever be caught?
