St David's Day 1st March

Dydd G yl Dewi hapus i bawb! That's Welsh for Happy St David's Day to all! St David is said to have been born around 520, St David is the patron saint of Wales.

It is said that St David was born in a wild thunderstorm on the cliffs of St David, the small city in Pembrokeshire which was later named after him. His parents have been said to be the king of Ceredigion, Sanctus and a nun called Nonnita (Non).

Around about 550, he founded a monastery close to his birthplace where he and his fellow monks lived a simple life, drinking water and eating only herbs and bread. David

became known as Dewi Dyrfwr (David the water drinker) as meat and beer were forbidden.

Although the monks farmed the surrounding land, David insisted that they did not use animals to carry their tools, they were to carry them. None of the monks were allowed any personal possessions and they spent evenings praying, reading and writing.

David was allegedly preaching to a large crowd in the village of Llanddewi Brefi. Some people had difficulty hearing him and a white dove landed on David's shoulder, and as it did, the ground on which he stood rose up to form a hill, making it possible for everyone to see and hear him where a church now stands. The dove became his emblem.

More than 60 churches in Wales had been dedicated to David by the 12th Century and many pilgrims visited his monastery in St David's.

You will find churches and chapels dedicated to David in south-west England and Brittany, as well as Wales. His influence also reached Ireland, where the Irish embrace his beliefs about caring for the natural world.


St David is believed to have died on 1 March 589.

Why the leek and daffodil?

When the Welsh were in battle with the Saxons, it is said that their clothes were so similar it was difficult to tell them apart. St David suggested that the Welsh men should wear a leek in their helmet to identify them and that is what they did. The

Welsh won the battle and the leek was then adopted as the emblem of Wales.

Wearing a daffodil is a more modern tradition which was publicised by David Lloyd George. A suggestion is that the daffodil is used simply because it grows in the spring (around the time of St David's Day on March



St Patricks Day 17th March.

Saint Patrick is Ireland's patron saint, known for spreading Christianity throughout the country as a missionary during the 5th century. The man who would come to be known as Saint

Patrick, apostle of Ireland, was born in Britain circa 386 A.D. Much of his life is unknown to historians and can't be verified, though some sources have listed his birth name as Maewyn Succat, with the name Patrick later taken on during his religious journeys or ordainment.

When Patrick was 16 years old, he was captured by Irish pirates. They brought him to Ireland where he was sold into slavery in Dalriada. There his job was to tend sheep. During his enslavement, he was called to Christianity and escaped his captors after six years. He returned to Ireland as a missionary, and in his teachings combined Irish pagan beliefs with Christian sacrament. He is annually honoured on his feast day 17th March.

His father, Calphurnius, was a deacon from a Roman family of high social standing. Patrick's mother, Conchessa, was a close relative of the great patron Saint Martin of Tours. Patrick's member grandfather. Pontius, was also а of clergy. Surprisingly, Patrick himself was not raised with a strong emphasis on religion. Education was not particularly stressed during his childhood either. Later in life, this would become a source of embarrassment for the spiritual icon, who would write in his Confessio, "I blush and fear exceedingly to reveal my lack of education."

Patrick came to view his enslavement as God's test of his faith. During his six years of captivity, he became deeply devoted to Christianity through constant prayer. In a vision, he saw the children of pagan Ireland reaching out their hands to him and grew increasingly determined to convert the Irish to Christianity.

Around 408 A.D., the idea of escaping enslavement came to Patrick in a dream, in which a voice promised him he would find his way home to Britain. Eager to see the dream materialise, Patrick convinced some sailors to let him board their ship. After three days of sailing, he and the crew abandoned the vessel in France and wandered, lost, for 28 days.

A free man once again, Patrick went to Auxerre, France, where he studied and entered the priesthood. He was ordained a deacon by the Bishop of Auxerre around 418 A.D.

As time passed, he never lost sight of his vision to convert Ireland to Christianity. In 432 A.D, he was ordained as a bishop and was soon sent by Pope Celestine I to Ireland to spread the gospel to non-believers while also providing support to the small community of Christians already living there.

Saint Patrick died circa 461 A.D. in Saul, Ireland, and is said to have been buried in the nearby town of Downpatrick, County Down. Many legends also have been associated with his life including that he drove away all the snakes from Ireland and he introduced the Holy Trinity through the three-leaved shamrock.

Saint Patrick is annually honoured with the celebration of Saint Patrick's Day which falls during the Christian season of Lent. For more than 1,000 years, the Irish have observed Saint Patrick's Day as a religious holiday. Traditionally, on Saint Patrick's Day, families attend church in the morning and observe other rituals — including eating a traditional meal of cabbage and Irish bacon.

FOOD MEMORIES from Antonia

Jollof Rice, much loved from South of the Sahara and along the coast of West Africa.

Spiced and stewed in a flavourful tomato broth, it is everything from "everyday" to celebration. The classic version is cooked with long-grain rice (Uncle Ben's plus any other rice depending on preference. If you're using thinner long grain rice like basmati rice or scented rice, use less stock.

Blend 2 tins of tomatoes with 2 onions, a scotch bonnet pepper plus a red sweet pepper. add seasonings of garlic, ginger, crushed pepper, thyme and all-purpose seasoning along with chicken stock, $1/2 - 2/3^{rd}$ tomato puree and a cup of water.

In a pot use a small amount of cooking oil and allow to get hot. lower the temperature and add blended tomatoes and water.

Cook for 30minutes or so on a medium heat. you are frying the stew until the oil is on the top. it will take about 1 hour.

Wash the rice thoroughly. I would say 2/3 full cups. When you add to the stew the rice should be completely covered with the stew and not be seen at all. No need for any salt. cook on low for 30/40mins. the jollof rice is cooked once all the stew is soaked up and the rice is soft and fluffy.

This can be eaten with salad or veg. Meats can be seasoned with garlic, ginger, cracked pepper, thyme and all-purpose seasoning and cooked in the stew.

Be mindful if you use chicken it has to be a boiler chicken as roasting chicken will be too soft in the stew.

This makes a large amount, but it can be frozen. Allow to defrost and steam and it comes up fresh as when you initially cooked it.

For the Jollof rice, the spices can be measured into a teaspoon and put in a blender.

To season meats/chicken I suggest the measurement of an eating spoon and also add salt.

It is very hot, so be mindful of this. Again it depends on how hot you like your food.

Learning to make Jollof was a rite of passage for me and I've gone through so many iterations each time trying to streamline the process while delivering the most flavour. The same seasoning used for the broth can be used for the seasoning of the meats, meats are marinaded overnight to give full flavour. Everybody cooks this dish differently.

Pharmacies offer lifeline ANI codeword scheme to domestic abuse victims

The government has teamed up with independent pharmacies and Boots to launch a domestic abuse Ask for ANI codeword scheme. From 14 January victims of domestic abuse will be able to access much needed support from thousands of pharmacies across the UK, backed by the government.

The Ask for ANI scheme allows those at risk or suffering from abuse to discreetly signal that they need help and access support. By asking for ANI, a trained pharmacy worker will offer a private space where they can understand if the victim needs to speak to the police or would like help to access support services such as a national or local domestic abuse helplines.

If you want to tell us about someone sleeping rough, you can contact <u>Street Link</u> on 0300 500 0914 who will take note of all the information that you provide and arrange for the rough sleeper to get access to local services and support.
