



POT LUCK

I have always enjoyed being around plants and soil, from the age of four on my dad's allotment through to having my own patch in the garden when I was about nine years of age.

I enjoyed going to the local market with my pocket money and was more than happy to get a couple of plants for threepence each and dash home to put them in the dusty piece of soil that I called 'my garden'. I never cared if they looked lost amidst that dry old patch. I used to water it but carrying a jug of water down fifty stairs from our rooms at the top of an old house was no easy task; as I dare not spill a drop because I would have to go back up fifty stairs to get a cloth to mop up the spills.

My patch was a burial ground for an assortment of goldfish and budgies. One fish got the full works as I asked all my friends to come over for his burial and even read a piece from my mum's bible. The next day I removed the fish to another spot, probably because I had got another threepenny plant from the market. Something had to give, as plants came before fish it seemed.



Moving to my next home upon becoming a wife, the garden soil was just as dusty as I moved only two streets away. This time I was moving up in the social strata of the sixties as I now had a rockery, the pinnacle of garden chic.

My next house set in motion my 'mobile garden' phase, as I left the dusty soil of the east end to be challenged by the clay of Essex. The rockery came with me to be placed upon thick clumps of old farmland now known as Overmead, my pearl in

an oyster of the 70s housing boom. Along with determination and my dad's old fork I battled with this, the largest of my gardens. With limited finances the purchase of a pretty peach tree helped to divert the eye from the distinct lack of plants around it. The garden seemed to reflect my life as it was then, and it never became the dream.

After seven years I left it for someone else to fulfil and made my way back to my own roots and settled on the soil of Greater London but it had potential. This garden would nurture more than plants. This garden saw the vision of a young girl with her threepenny plants turn a dream into a place where childhood and friendships blossomed alongside flowers and fun. There were barbeques, celebrations, tea parties, and fundraising events. Shrubs, plants and ponds were constantly moved around to accommodate swings, climbing frames and a zip wire to whiz shrieking children from one end of the garden to another. This garden was everything a garden should be, one that nurtured not only plants but happy memories to be stored forever.

There were quiet moments in the sun when two people sat on a bench at the end of a long day to reflect upon life. Both agreed that this was where their hearts lie, and their dreams were fulfilled.

FOOD MEMORIES from Ruth

This is a recipe my sister gave me over 40 years ago. It's very easy and delicious and when I've served it, people think I've spent

hours in the kitchen (obviously, I don't make them think otherwise)

POULET SAVOIRED (Savoire Chicken)

Ingredients: 4 chicken portions

1½ ozs melted butter

2 level TBSN flour

3/4 pint of stock and herbs

4 TBSN white wine (optional)

½ pint thick fresh cream

2 TBSN French mustard

1 TSPN fresh or dried tarragon

2 TBSN grated cheddar or

Salt and pepper to taste

- Cook chicken portions in oven in the usual way.
- To make the sauce
- Melt the butter in a saucepan, add flour, stock and herbs.
- ❖ SLOWLY ADD THE WINE
- add the cream, mustard, tarragon, cheese & salt and pepper to taste.

Place chicken portions in serving dish and pour sauce over chicken. Brown slightly under grill and serve with assorted vegetables. Instead of chicken, you can use vegetables like leeks or cauliflower.

Freeze excess sauce into ice block trays so you can thaw one or two blocks at a time, as and when needed.

I have just completed a survey from the above charity which we support every year with the Operation Christmas Child Shoe Box Appeal. Unfortunately, this could not be properly organised last year. This year we are asking for supporters to fill boxes, probably in September, as the collection date this year is $15^{th} - 21^{st}$ November 2021.

Each year thousands of people like you generously pack shoebox gifts to bless children in need around the world. Find out all you need to know about how to pack your shoebox gift below.

- Get an empty medium sized shoebox, and wrap the box and lid separately in colourful wrapping paper or use preprinted shoeboxes available in church.
- Attach the appropriate boy/girl label. Select an age category 2-4, 5-9 or 10-14 and attach the label to the top of your shoebox.
- Fill your shoebox with a selection of fun toys, hygiene items and school supplies. If possible, include one or two special items you know a child will love such as a doll, cuddly toy or deflated football with pump.

Suggested Items

Football and pump, cuddly toys, dolls, toy cars, small musical instruments, yo-yos, skipping ropes, balls, small puzzles.

Pens, pencils & sharpeners, crayons or felt pens, stamps & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks, solar calculators, colouring & picture books.

Toothbrush, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel. Hat, gloves, scarf, sunglasses, cap, socks, T-shirt, flip-flops, hair accessories, jewellery set, watch, wind-up torch.

DO NOT INCLUDE

Toothpaste, sweets, lotions and liquids; used or damaged items; war-related items; seeds, gum, chocolate or food items; religious or political literature; medicines, aerosol cans, sharp or fragile items.

Make your project donation. A suggested donation of £5 is essential to cover project costs, including shipping, to enable a local church or group overseas to lead a safe, well-organised children's event where your shoebox will be given to a child in need. this can be included in an envelope in the box or donated online.

Give online at <u>Follow Your Box</u> and you can print out a barcode and place it inside your shoebox on top of the contents. This will enable us to tell you which country your shoebox gets sent to.

Personalise & Pray Personalise your shoebox by including a hand written note and a photograph of yourself, your group or your family. You may also like to pray for the child that will receive your gift.

Christians Against Poverty (CAP) provides free debt help and local community groups across the UK. Our free services, run with local churches, provide practical and emotional support and show people that there is always hope.
