A statement and prayer on the Afghanistan crisis

The President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference offer the following statement regarding the crisis in Afghanistan.

The Taliban's advance in Afghanistan has taken place more quickly than anyone predicted. Over the past few days we have received distressing reports about the situation in Kabul, as well as across the country.

Following our military involvement, the UK bears a heavy responsibility towards the people of Afghanistan and must act to support all who fear for their future and seek asylum. Over the course of this conflict, members of our churches have been supporting those who have been forced to flee and at this critical time our response must be one of compassion and generosity. As Members of Parliament are recalled, we hope that there might be an unequivocal guarantee to support those seeking asylum, and that broad and accessible routes to the UK are created for those seeking sanctuary from Afghanistan.

Methodist chaplains have served members of our Armed Forces in Afghanistan over the past 20 years and we are mindful of them and of all who bear the scars of this conflict. We remember particularly those still serving, veterans,

civilian colleagues and their families for whom the current situation in Afghanistan may be evoking difficult memories.

Our hearts go out to women in Afghanistan who have taken the opportunity to lead in many ways, making contributions in their communities, business and politics. They now fear that these freedoms will be reversed. We call on all governments everywhere to uphold the empowerment of women and to ensure that the new government in Afghanistan maintains the freedoms that have been gained in recent years.

In the face of uncertainty in Afghanistan and the region we know that many will want to join us in prayer.

We hear from Christian Leaders in Haiti

Both earthquakes the last one that hit Haiti in 2010 and the one only three days old took everybody by surprise but for different reasons. The January 12 earthquake in 2010 surprised us because Haitians had become unaccustomed to the idea of earthquakes. Before 2010, the last major earthquake that hit Haiti dated back to 1842. People had forgotten what an earthquake looked like. That alone caused many to perish in the 2010 earthquake.

The recent earthquake surprised us in a different way: No one expected the country to get hit again within such a short

time. At a time when the nation is licking its wounds wounds inflicted by the emergence of the Delta variant of COVID-19, by the political uncertainty in which the nation has been plunged by the recent assassination of President Jovenel Moïse, by all sorts of social and political unrest an earthquake within 11 years of the 2010 devastating earthquake was the last thing that we expected to befall Haiti!

But we Haitians are very resilient. Despite everything that happens to us, the average Haitian remains steadfast in his belief that "Bondye bon" ("God is good"). That makes it relatively easy for the church to maintain the fact that God is perfectly good, almighty, and all-knowing while at the same time allowing evil and suffering in the world.

But the church is aware of the truth of this saying: "People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care." Hence the emphasis the church puts on ministering to the Haitian people in the midst of the direst disasters that hit the country. Even people who are most hostile to the church acknowledge her positive impact on Haitian society, especially during times of national catastrophe.

Help us by praying for:

- Safe transportation of humanitarian relief and equitable distribution of help to all the victims.
- Powerful witness of Christian compassion during the crisis.
- Generous contributions to arrive in a timely fashion for rebuilding, including for damaged churches.
-) Limited greed and misuse of funds and relief materials.
- Vision and political will for local authorities so they seek primarily the welfare of the people.
- Political breakthrough and stability through meaningful negotiations among political groups and civil society so

- that the nation can go forward after the assassination of the president.
- That credible and experienced citizens in-country and in the diaspora are raised and find visibility as potential political leaders for the nation.
-) Protection from rain and tropical storm that are expected this week.

Please offer thanks for:

- Lives spared because the earthquake happened during daytime.
-) Communications networks did not go down and information was able reach the outside world quickly.
- Major Christians organizations like Compassion, World Vision, Federation of Protestant Churches, and the Haiti Evangelical Fellowship of Churches.

The Mediterranean region is currently experiencing its worst heatwave in decades, while the fire outbreak since July has continued to spread to more countries and to burn larger areas, the firefighting operations are mobilizing additional resources in attempts to contain the fires.

We pray for those affected by the raging wildfires in Turkey, Greece, Italy & Spain and give thanks for the brave firefighters and volunteers from the Red Cross societies in the affected countries who are providing support to affected populations.

I served customers, I carried out the background admin tasks, I balanced the till and I made copious amounts of tea. Then, I applied for a position in the new branch, which was to be in Lombard Street, the very heart of the city of London. This was to be a flagship of excellence. Only the very best would be employed to work there and I was thrilled when I was selected. But when I got there, I was simply another bank clerk. I served the customers, I balanced the till, I performed background admin tasks and I continued to make copious amounts of tea. The surroundings were different but I carried out the same roles that I had done in the Brixton branch of the bank.



Josie's involvement with helping the young people in the church started a long time before she came to The Drive.

She used to attend a church in The Drive which is no longer there now (she thinks it is where Whitfield Court is now). A lady in the Sunday School who ran the 3–5-year-old group was standing down so Josie agreed to take it on and she really enjoyed that. She would make it like a little party with eats and drinks and then the Mums would come and collect them

Sometime after Josie moved to The Drive Methodist, she agreed to help out in other ways. She ran the church crèche for a number of years and Ruth was one of her many volunteers. When they did the crèche together, in addition to caring for the children, they found it was also a great opportunity to put the world to rights while listening to the sermon on the loudspeaker. Josie remembers having twin girls for quite a while where one was always very good and the other one always cried.

In addition to this, she became the Cradle Roll Secretary at The Drive. When a new baby arrived, Josie would visit the family at home to take an interest in them. She would then have a role at the Christening where, at a certain stage in the service, she would have to say 6 words and give the parents a lighted candle. She always found it incredibly daunting when it was her time to speak. She would light the candle then turn round and see all these faces looking at her. She managed it, but it was not something that came naturally to her.

She used to visit the Mums after the Christening as well and remembers visiting Priya when Rochelle was tiny which was delightful. One Mum told her the reason they started coming to church was because she visited them.

She always enjoyed her involvement with the children but was happy to hand over to Janet Wragg at the right moment.

In addition to the above, she took part in one of the plays that Barbara Foster arranged for the Drama Group. She played one of a number of women in prison - not exactly type casting! During the other plays, Josie would help with the refreshments and Barbara always insisted that everyone should be quiet during a performance, so they were not allowed to wash up until after the performance.

Lots of memories Josie, I remember you visiting my daughter Kelly and her children following their baptisms, one of whom has just got married! Everyone enjoyed a visit from Josie. LB

Here's a blast from the past from Anne

The 60's Leaving Full Time Education

Art comes in many forms but for me the 'Art' that inspired me, involved a hairbrush which gave me the skills that would take me forward in ways I could never have imagined at the tender age of sixteen.

I found the following account which was written around the early 80s.

In 1961 my failure to get a place in the GCE Art class led to me to find a substitute for the artistic capabilities I longed to have. My Saturday job in a local hair salon suddenly became more interesting when I was praised for a style I created for a young colleague. I decided to think seriously about leaving school earlier than planned as I was very unhappy. My mum went to see my headmistress who was appalled to think that I wanted to give up my education and remarked;

"If there is another war what Anne would do with hairdressing" I remember my mum saying, "We hope there never will be another War"

With poor exam results that year Miss Shaw decided that I could leave the John Howard Grammar School in Hackney.

My first thought was to get a job in a salon in the west end of London where Sixties fashion was taking over from post war fifties styles. Following a discussion with my parents I decided to accept the full-time job that my Saturday employer offered me, it seemed a good idea as I could walk to work and avoid travel costs.

In August 1961 my parents signed my apprenticeship papers that confirmed I would be taught hairdressing over a period of three years for £2.10 shillings (£2.50p) for a 52-hour week to include one hour lunch breaks.

After three years I would be a fully qualified hairstylist and proceed to work for a further two years as an Improver. I remember my mum remarking upon the shabby papers she had to sign. I took little notice as I could not wait to get started on my chosen career.

Although I was used to the long hours I worked on a Saturday, the reality of it all struck me at 3.30pm on that first day of my working life as I would have been walking home from school at that time, instead I had another two and a half hours to work. It was an eternity, and we rarely got the hour for lunch as promised and I remember feeling so tired as we were not allowed to sit down in the salon. Were it not for my passion to learn and to use my skills in the new world of fashion, I probably would have joined my friends in secretarial work. I was sixteen and had a long way to go yet as study books made way for cleaning duties.

The salon was very old, it and seen better days and faced the hospital where I was born and almost died, but fate dictated my path through life and 'Maison Black' was to give me my first experience of it.

Cleaning, teamaking, laundry and errands took up most of my day and in the winter, it was my job to go outside to collect a

bucket of coal and make up the fire. Central heating was unheard of in the east end and Maison Blacks was no different to any other business. Shops were cold places, and we knew no different.

Occasionally I was asked to shampoo a client's hair and I felt so pleased with myself when I was told how well I had done. Sometimes clients would give me threepence or sixpence tip. In a good week I could take about 10 shillings (50p) in tips.

We had two senior stylists Iris and Barbara, they were in their twenties and newly married. They were very popular with the clients as their skills were excellent but confined to the pre-war waves and curls.

There were perm clubs and the women would pay in about one shilling a week and given a number. If their number was pulled out of the box that week, they would have their perm. I remember when a client pulled out a number that gave her the nearest week to Christmas, she was so happy with that. Mr Black had their money coming in all through the year, his salon was so popular that on Saturdays the women would queue all the way up the stairs as he never took appointments.

One Saturday the boiler broke down and he told me to go and fill the bath with water, I turned on the tap and left it to fill up, then I heard him yelling, he was so angry as I had turned on the hot tap and the tank had emptied. I am smiling at the memory, but I never smiled that day!

We had a young Saturday girl and there was a rumour that Mr Black had been too familiar with her and her parents came to

the salon. Whatever they discussed must have settled the issue as she continued working there. I remember Mrs Black being so upset and saying that there had been a mistake. As shy as I was if he had tried to treat me in that way, I would have left the salon.

Mr Black was a taskmaster, and we hardly ever got a lunch break on a Saturday. Iris and Barbara would sometimes eat their lunch in the salon as they worked. We started work at 7am on Saturday and at about 2pm one day when I had not been able to go for a break, I felt faint and on the spur of the moment I rang home and my dad answered so I moaned to him. I never gave a thought that my dad would come to the shop and within about 15 minutes I heard someone say, "Annes' dad is downstairs" Mr Black was livid, he never went down to face my dad but immediately told me to go for my lunch. I ran down to see my dad and told him that I was going to have my lunch. My dad wanted to go and see him but I assured him that it was ok.

My dad loved me so much but in those days our mums would sort out problems, but wherever mum was that day, my dear dad was not going to stand by and do nothing. I would like to have seen Mr Black next to my dad as my dad was over six feet tall and my boss was much shorter. I had my lunch in the staffroom and Mr Black ignored me for the rest of the day.

The stylists began to let us younger ones try out styles on one another. At home I practised on my mum, nan and aunts and I was beginning to become accomplished with the scissors. One day a regular client came in with her daughter who was the same age as myself, Iris asked the girl if she would like me to cut her hair and I was so pleased when she agreed and

asked me for a 'Feather cut.' Linda became my first client, best friend and eventually Godmother to my daughter. We are friends to this day.

Large rollers, steel combs and backcombing were taking place of curling rods, pins and finger waves. Hair Lacquer came in large bottles and we had to pour it into plastic bottles that were squeezed in order to release the gluey substance that was sprayed onto the hair to keep it in place.

Rather than brush their new bouffant styles out, the women would apply more lacquer each day to keep their hair in place, consequently on their next visit we would have to try to wash this glue out of their hair.

Shops closed at 1pm on Thursdays and on one of those days Mr Black took us to see his new bungalow in North London, it was beautiful and stood on a lot of land. Iris and Barbara used to say they, "bought his new bungalow, as they worked so hard for him"

Cooks Corner

GROWN UP JELLY

In the Bendon house we enjoy 'grown up jelly' this is simply jelly cubes melted with a little boiling water and topped up with juice or sparking drinks and frozen fruit. For example, cranberry or grape juice works well with strawberry or raspberry jelly, while pineapple or apple juice is good with lemon or orange jelly ...you get the idea?

The addition of the frozen fruit not only makes the jelly more delicious; it also sets the jelly very quickly. Very handy if you need a quick dessert.

Covid News

From this week people who are double jabbed or under 18 are no longer legally required to self-isolate if they are identified as a close contact of a positive COVID-19 case. The change is part of the government's step 4 of the roadmap out of lockdown.

Instead of self-isolating, those who are double jabbed and under 18s identified as close contacts of positive coronavirus cases are being advised to get a free PCR test as soon as possible. Anyone who may not be vaccinated for specific reasons is also exempt from self-isolation.

It remains important to continue to:

J	wash your hands regularly
J	wear a face covering when using public transport or in crowded spaces
J	meet others in outdoor spaces wherever possible
J	get tested regularly.

Appointments for vaccinations are available between 4pm to 7pm and can be booked by calling the free phone line 0800 038 59 29.
