Get Ready!

Every activity or situation needs adequate preparation and tools. Going into something ill equipped may mean not succeeding.

As a human race we found ourselves ill prepared to face and deal with the pandemic, because those in the know ignored the information they had, with catastrophic outcomes for all.

As we move away from Christmas and Epiphany, we have been reminded in those seasons of "God with us", the incarnation of God in the human person of Jesus Christ, who through his teachings and experiences showed the need for His disciples to "remain in Him" and to tap into the power of the Holy Spirit to face all challenges and to do the will of God.

So, as we enter into the season of Lent; we are reminded of tools we will need to get through this time of testing, fasting and self denial.

Whether we give up something or take on acts of kindness for the 40 days of Lent beginning on Ash Wednesday (Sunday/Sabbath excluded), I wish to offer tools that we can use to equip us on this journey of faith as we consider what the Methodist Way of Life can help.

A Methodist Way of Life is how we try to live our lives in response to God's love, made known to us in Jesus. Based on our Wesleyan tradition expressed in "Our Calling", we will explore how we can use: prayer, worship, caring, hospitality and service as tools to equip us through Lent.

- 1. **Pray** engage in a daily "conversation" time with God. A time where we use speech and silence to express what is in us and to listen for God. Our prayer time may be structured on bible reading, reflection and silence.
- 2. **Worship** regularly engaging with others in worship increases our understanding of scripture, gives us others to pray with; and as we sing and say words together we are reminded that we are not alone.
- 3. **Care** caring for ourselves and others helps build a community based on love of neighbours as self. Self care includes adequate rest, recreation enabling us to look after others.
- 4. **Hospitality** this is an attitude of openness to others, to learn about and from them, widening our understanding allowing us to be changed by the encounter. This attitude allows us to be generous givers and recipients of hospitality.
- 5. **Service** this is about being good neighbour. Recognising that our neighbours are not just those next to us but includes all those we live with on this home we call earth. It is about lending a helping hand to those in need. In giving, we receive a blessing as we bless others.

I hope that we can use all the above to equip us not just in Lent but when we emerge on the other side of Easter we will have grown in our discipleship.

May God enrich your Christian journey in this season.

Here, John details the damage he experienced from Storm Eunice.
Thankfully this is the only account I have from our church family, so I hope this means nothing too awful happened to you or your properties. LB

Storm Eunice on Friday night decided to pick on my block of 12 flats and relieve us of the asphalt roof covering. Large sheets of asphalt, weighing several tons, were either thrown by the storm into our rear garden, or left hanging off the roof.

This only left us with a chipboard covering (1970's specification) and no protection from the heavy rain. As I am on the top floor, I had rain water pouring in through the ceiling and down the walls. It was panic for a while trying to find enough buckets and pans, to catch what I could of the yellow water filtering through the chipboard.

The next day our Managing Agent found a roofer at short notice, who covered the whole roof area with heavy duty plastic sheeting. Unfortunately most of this was ripped off on Sunday night by the next storm. We were left with large length of plastic strips flapping against the side of the building. Again the panic to stop the water that was pouring in.

Monday the roofers would not go back onto the roof because of the dangerously strong winds. So it wasn't until the Tuesday that they were able to go up and resecure the plastic sheets.

I spent most of Monday, with my daughter, emptying my wardrobes (who says women have too many clothes?) and packing into suitcases and boxes, plus some of her wardrobe space.

The good news is that the insurance assessor came in on the Wednesday. Waiting to hear if roof replacement can go ahead, or whether more watertight, temporary, covering to be installed. Of the top four flats, three are badly water damaged. Another four on the middle floor have slight water damage. I am able to use my flat in the day, but because of the damp and smells I have to sleep at my daughter's.

Looking on the bright side, nobody was hurt! Our small community is talking more to compare stories. People act in strange ways. Some think it is the end of the world because they have slight damage to part of their home.

Others, who have extensive damage and severe disruption, seem to accept that it is nothing that can't be fixed in time.

The moral is: Have faith and try not to worry. Or, make sure you have a good insurance policy!!

So sorry you have had to cope with this John and wish you well in clearing the damage. We hope you will soon be able to return to your flat permanently.**LB**

HERE'S ANDREW.....

SINGING THE FAITH – THE NINTH AND TENTH YEARS I THE LORD OF ZOOM AND SKYPE



We first used the new Methodist hymnal *Singing the Faith* on Sunday 15th January 2012. Since then I have kept a note of the hymns and songs used (from now on, I'll just refer to them as "songs"). I haven't done one of these reports for two years – for obvious reasons! – so this round-up of song stats covers the services that happened in church during 2020 and 2021, and does not include songs used when we were WFH (worshipping from home...)

Not included in these figures are the 7 songs chosen by preachers that are not in *Singing the Faith*, and any songs the choir has sung alone.

Over the two years we sang 142 different songs from Singing the Faith, which is 21 fewer than were used in 2019. These were the most frequently used songs: 5 times 663 I the Lord of sea and sky
4 times 94 To God be the glory
440 Amazing grace
503 Love divine
550 Forth in thy name
3 times 78 Give thanks with a grateful heart
255 The kingdom of God
322 How sweet the name of Jesus sounds
362 Meekness and majesty
407 Hear the call of the kingdom
465 Guide me O thou great Jehovah
693 Beauty for brokenness

A further 29 songs were chosen twice and the remaining 102 just once. Of the total 142 songs used, 12 were completely new to us.

Taking the ten years we have been using *Singing the Faith* overall, we have now used 450 of the 790 songs available (not including the Canticles and Psalms section), which works out at 57 percent. Two of the songs still in the overall top 10 - 51 *Great is thy faithfulness* and 59 *Lord the light of your life is shining (Shine Jesus shine)* were, surprisingly, not chosen at all in 2020/21.

Counting 2020/21 as one year, 15 songs have been used at least once every year since 2012. In contrast, 19 of the 450 songs used so far were sung once back in 2012 and have not been used since.

The top two hymns in the first decade of *Singing the Faith* remains the same:

48 times 94 To God be the glory, great things he has done

41 times 20 Be still, for the presence of the Lord

Whilst these two have been consistently in the top two, the places just beneath have been changing year by year – with the 5 times we sang 663 *I the Lord of sea and sky* in 2020/21, it has leapfrogged into third place overall.

Singing makes us feel good.

Endorphins are released when we sing which help to promote positive feelings. This is especially true when we sing with other people. Group singing also induces the production of oxytocin (the bonding hormone). This can reduce stress, anxiety and increase feelings of trust and wellbeing.



So what is Ash Wednesday?

Each year, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent and is always 46 days before Easter Sunday. Lent is a 40-day season (not counting Sundays) marked by repentance, fasting, reflection, and ultimately celebration. The 40-day period represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him. Lent asks believers to set aside a time each year for similar fasting, marking an intentional season of focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice, and resurrection.

On Ash Wednesday, the palm leaves and crosses saved from last year's Palm Sunday are burnt into grey ashes. They are then smeared in the shape of a cross onto the foreheads of Christian people.

It's a powerful symbol – an unexpected image. If you're walking down the street or coming out of a shop and you happen to pass someone who has recently been at a church service and is marked with this prominent Lenten sign, you'll look twice. The cross makes a person stand out.

But not just the person. This sign, whether worn on the forehead or not, signals for all Western Christians the beginning of Lent. Focussed reflection follows as it did for Jesus when he spent 40 days in the wilderness prior to three years of itinerant ministry.

But Ash Wednesday is not just about repairing ourselves as individuals. It is also about re-establishing good and balanced relationships with those around us.

In the Eastern Catholic and Orthodox traditions, the beginning of Lent is signalled differently – not just on a different date but with a different day. "Clean Monday", a day of strict fasting, reminds Eastern Christians that Lent begins with good intentions and a desire to clean our spiritual house. On this day, and frequently throughout Lent, Christians pray the Prayer of St. Ephrem the Syrian.

O Lord and Master of my life, keep from me the spirit of indifference and discouragement, lust for power, and idle chatter.

Instead, grant to me, your servant, the spirit of wholeness of being, humble-mindedness, patience, and love.

O Lord and King, grant me the grace to be aware of my sins and not to judge my brother; for you are blessed now and forever. Amen.

It's a prayer for self-awareness and of awareness of our brothers and sisters.

Cleanliness next to Godliness

Was it just a coincidence that the Round Chapel was in the vicinity of the Hackney Baths. The church cleansed our souls every Sunday and the baths cleansed our bodies on a Saturday. In the east end of London, a bathroom was a luxury and the house where I grew up, most probably had one when it was built, as it was on a 'posh' road where my mum longed to live when she was a young girl.

Fate intervened and wartime bombing meant that larger properties left standing, were housing several families. My parents considered themselves very fortunate to find three small rooms at the top of a house that once belonged to a doctor.

The lack of a bathroom had to be tolerated but as long as they had water, a stove, a saucepan and a sink, it was a daily 'wash down' in the kitchen. My earliest memory of bath time circa 1949, was of a small tin bath en situ in front of the fireplace in the kitchen. My mum boiled water in saucepans on the stove, filled the bath and with her help I got into it.

This was the routine until I outgrew the tin bath and mum decided it was time to take me to the Hackney Baths for a 'proper' bath. For the uninitiated this was an experience never to be forgotten.

There were two doors, one for males and one for females. I remember the hot, steamy interior of the long narrow enclosure. Each cubicle had a large metal door with a number on it. To the right of the door was an enormous handle which the attendant turned to fill the bath with water.

When you were called to the cubicle you had to note your door number, as you were expected to call out the number, should you require some more water once inside the bath. The noise coming from inside these baths was


deafening; gushing water, doors clanging, voices calling out,

" More water number xxx." This weekly routine carried on until my mum decided that I was old enough to go on my own.

A successful visit much depended upon the need to have a loud voice, which is all very well when you have your mum to call out, "More/hot, More/cold" but my vocal tones were not honed as yet to the challenges of the bathing system of the Hackney Baths. My calls for," More cold in number ten please", were in vain and so it was that I arrived home to tell my mum that I had just about dipped my flannel in the water, let alone myself!

I had to get used to the baths but life moves on and eventually I had my own home with a bathroom but I treasure my memories of those days, for they make me appreciate the comforts I now have. I also appreciate my mum and women like her who lived through the hardship of Wartime.




