

Mmasape's Easter Message

Christ's death and resurrection was for all of humankind

n the story of creation, we read: "So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them." (Gen 1.27 NIV), yet the treatment of people (mankind) in this world does not reflect the equality given to all people at creation. Also, it does not reflect the equality of Christ's sacrifice on the cross: "And by that will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all."

At this Easter season may we, who have been redeemed by the death and resurrection of Christ rise to a newness of life with him with new attitudes and outlook towards all people. In Jesus there is no colour bar; all are equally valued and loved. We therefore as a church of Christ cannot afford to condone the treatment of people facing humanitarian crisis differently. Need is need, it does not choose race. Suffering is the same no matter where you come from and the response to need and suffering means not to choose to offer more to some.

Over the last few months in our circuit, we have been and are continuing to review how to best utilise the resources we have (churches, money, ministerial staff and volunteers) to best serve the community and to share the gospel message. This requires careful and honest consideration of where good stewardship is not practiced and where pruning needs to

happen so that new healthy growth may be encouraged. So, as we look forward to the annual reminder of hope springing fourth from the cross as Christ is risen on Easter Day, may we look forward with the same renewed hope to a fresh sprinkling of life within our churches in the BDI circuit.

May our giving, caring and serving both in and out of church be reflective of the "other"- centred love of Christ which sought to challenge power and to bring the marginalised into the centre of community as he healed and restored all to wholeness be they Jew or gentile.

We are called to love all and to challenge the seats of power whenever they sow separation and inequality amongst people. The call to support refugees still stands, be they from east, west, south or north. It is about humanity and not race, therefore let us love all as "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son (to die once for all for the whole world), so that whoever believes in Him may not perish but have eternal life." (John 3.16)

Wishing you a blessed Easter overflowing with the joy of renewed hope for a better world in which we are a part in bringing forth.

A Statement from The Methodist Peace Fellowship Peace Together

To the People called Methodist,

The invasion of Ukraine calls us to step up. As people that want to promote peace as a way of life, we cannot ignore events between Russia and Ukraine. The invasion of a country, the suppression of its people and the annihilation of its culture is contrary to the Gospel imperative for all to have 'life in all its fullness'. We may feel helpless and powerless but we need to find ways to counter the narrative of aggression and to support by prayer and practical action the people of Ukraine. We cannot sit back, we need to step up.

The invasion of Ukraine also calls us to step back. As people who see peace not simply as absence of war, but as the shalom of struggle within all human relationships, we need to be mindful of the bigger picture. Offering hospitality to Ukrainian refugees is paramount, but we must not forget the needs and stories of other refugees from other countries. Whilst we want to support Ukrainians at this particular time we need to be alert to any tendency to privilege White Europeans when we offer hospitality. Compassion is always unconditional never selective.

The invasion of Ukraine calls us to step forward. We are surrounded by rhetoric, so we need to strive for truth. We need to be careful that we are not simply inhabiting the echo chamber of our own prejudices. Situations like this are complex and nuanced. We need to be mindful of hatred at every turn, not least towards the people of Russia.

Whilst we are criticising oppressive and aggressive actions, we must not demonise a whole nation because of the actions of a despot. We must always step forward to challenge vitriol, even when it is directed to people whom the conflict styles as 'enemies'.

The Methodist Peace Fellowship is calling all Methodists, all people of faith, all humanity to take steps of prophetic action in the face of the current invasion of Ukraine. We are compelled to step up, to step back and to step forward, with courage, insight and wisdom, mindful that all are loved equally in the light of God's love.

Membership





MAUNDAY THURSDAY

Maundy Thursday is part of the Christian celebration of Easter. The word Maundy comes from the latin, 'mandatum', or 'command' which refers to the instructions Jesus gave his disciples on the night of His Last Supper with them; that people should love one another. He then washed the feet of his disciples as an act of kindness.

This period ('The Triduum') is one big celebration, remembering the last supper, the crucifixion and the death of Jesus, and the Resurrection to new life.

In many countries the day is known as Holy Thursday and is a public holiday. It is always on the last Thursday before Easter.

A MEMORABLE VISIT

On 23rd February I received an email via the Church website from Richard Waple, who lives in America and is researching his family history, saying that his parents were married at our church in 1948 and Eric R Waple, his father, was present at the Stone laying ceremony for the building of the Sunday School block of the Church, in 1931.

Richard worked for Lloyds Bank and was sent to Chicago in 1975, for 2 years, but was kept there until retirement, and it was there he met and married his wife, Kathleen.

Through emails, I learned that Richard and his wife were coming to England and wanted to know if would be possible to see the Church. He was also interested in finding his parents grave and wondered if we had a cemetery at the Church. Evidently his grandfather had purchased a plot at Barkingside Cemetery, and I was able to find out who was buried in that plot and let him know. I was also able to obtain a plan so that he could find the plot easily.

Richard and Kathleen arrived in the UK and we arranged to meet at the Church on Friday 11th March 2022. They came to Redbridge Station at about 9.30 and had a walk around the area to Highlands School, where Richard and his father went to school, Windermere Gardens, where some of the family had lived, and then met me at 12.30 at the Church.

As the Pre-School were at Lunch, Kay very kindly let us see the Hall block and the garden behind the Cranbrook room before we went into the Church. As we came out of the Hall, Richard looked across at the houses opposite and said "205 The Drive. That's where I used to live"

In the Church, they saw the list of preachers and the name Rev'd Mmasape Zihle, and asked "Where does he come from?" I explained that "She" came from South Africa. They were fascinated by the stained-glass windows. As I said, they are from the Chicago area of Illinois, USA, and two of the windows have Illinois addresses on them.

Myra Thomas came from Park Ridge, Illinois, and she was Sunday School Teacher to Sir Sydney Robinson, JP, when he lived in the USA for a time. Another window is in memory of Rev'd William Henry Holmes, Minister of the Hemenway Methodist Church in Evanston, Illinois, which was a church that Sir Sydney Robinson attended whilst in the area. Kathleen got very excited when she saw this window as Evanston was her birth town!

All four of the stained-glass windows in the Church were given by Sir Sydney Robinson. Until Myra Thomas passed away, I believe I am right in saying that the Thomas Family were very generous and sent money to the Church on many occasions, and one of those gifts was used to purchase the Choir Gowns that we now wear.

When we finished at the Church, we went the New Fairlop Oak for a light lunch to which I was treated! After lunch we made our way to Barkingside Cemetery where Richard was able to see the grave of his grandmother whilst Kathleen and I sat in the car.

The last port of call was Bancrofts School where I believe Richard's father was a pupil. Unfortunately, we arrived there as the pupils were coming out and it was not possible for Richard to gain entry to see if there were any records referring to him. Again, Kathleen and I sat in the car until Richard returned when I drove them back to Redbridge Station so that they could return to their lodgings.

Richard and Kathleen are a charming couple with whom I got on very well. It was a real pleasure to meet them and, as they come to the UK most years have said that would like to come to a service at the Church one year when they are here.



You may recall from John's article in the March edition; the extensive damage caused to his flat by Storm Eunice. Here, John gives an update:

Following on from the 5th March, the mop up operation still continues.

My flat is uninhabitable and completely bare. Dehumidifiers and fans are working 24 hours a day to dry out the walls and ceilings.

The roofers came in on 7th March. They spent the week removing what was left of the original roof covering and laying a new water proof membrane, which wasn't 100% successful as we found out when it next rained.

On 14th March the new insulation boards arrived, which took most of the week to install and seal. After that they will lay the final roof covering.

Builders have been booked to come into my flat and strip all the walls and ceilings. It then remains to be seen whether any of the ceilings need to be taken down and replaced.

I can well sympathise with the Ukrainian refugees who are being offered a room in a family home. To be displaced and have to rely on the charity of others is both humbling and gratifying.

ALL ABOUT

HOT CROSS BUNS



This is the season at which all good Christians devour hot cross buns for breakfast, under the comfortable impression that a religious duty is being performed.'

So stated the magazine Figaro in London in 1836. Despite the enduring popularity of the hot cross bun — Tesco alone sell 70 million by the end of Easter weekend — it's doubtful that any person today savouring a toasted and buttered one at breakfast, teatime or at any other time for that matter much considers the godliness of their action.

Traditionally eaten on Good Friday to commemorate the Crucifixion, hot cross buns found an enemy in Elizabeth I, who, in 1592, finding too much Popery in their popularity, banned their consumption except on specific holidays. The embargo was eventually lifted and, by the 1700s, sweet, spicy, fruity buns were sold on the streets of towns and cities with the familiar cry of 'one a penny, two a penny' (a penny bought you a large bun or two small ones).

They were first recorded in the 1773 Poor Robin's Almanack, which seems rather late considering that, in the 14th century, a monk in St Albans is said to have distributed them among the needy.

Looking even further back, some have claimed that loaves marked with a cross found at Herculaneum are the original precursors to hot cross buns. It's technically possible that this was a commemorative act – Christ had been nailed to the cross half a century earlier after all, and some claim that there were Christians in Pompeii by AD79 – but it's likely they were incised in this way to make them easier to break apart.

Whatever the truth of it, we know for certain that crossed buns were eaten by the Saxons to honour Eostre, celebrated in April, whose name, according to the Venerable Bede, is the origin of the word Easter. For Eostre, goddess of the dawn and fertility, the cross symbolised the four quarters of the Moon. As was often the case, a Christian tradition was stamped on top of a pagan festival, turning Eostre's feast into a celebration of Christ. And so the cross atop the bun came to stand for not only the Crucifixion, but also the intersection of the Earth (horizontal) with Heaven (vertical) — the human and the divine.

Later enthusiasts included, unsurprisingly, Samuel Pepys, who enjoyed a hearty 'Lenten supper' of buns washed down with ale, and Dr Johnson, who, on Good Friday in 1783, sensibly breakfasted on 'tea without milk, and... a cross bun to prevent faintness'.

Whether Dr Johnson concerned himself with the pious nature of his repast, or with the myriad superstitions surrounding the sticky confections, is unknown.

These included the practice of sharing a bun to ensure lasting friendship ('Half for you and half for me,/Between us two shall goodwill be'), taking a bun to sea to prevent shipwreck and, most common of all, hanging a bun in the kitchen for a year to bring luck (and, hopefully, not too many flies), hence:

Good Friday comes this month the old woman runs

With one or two a-penny hot cross buns, Whose virtue is, if you believe what's said, They'll not grow mouldy like the common bread.

There exists, in Essex, a hot cross bun that was baked more than 200 years ago, in 1807, and another in London is dated 1821, giving credence to the belief that a bun baked on Good Friday doesn't decay, although Lord (or perhaps Eostre) knows why.

I have a very clear memory of my dad cycling to the bakers on Good Friday morning to buy Hot Cross Buns. They were in a white paper bag, warm sticky and beautifully glazed and shiny. We ate and enjoyed the delicious buns and waited until the next Good Friday, when we could enjoy them again and that's why they were so special. LB

Bullies never win

One of my mother's favourite aphorisms was 'bullies never win and cheats never prosper'. Re-assuring words, but challenging to appreciate when faced with the might of Russian armour on the streets of Kyiv. I'm not sure I can add much more to the millions of words already published in the last few days about President Putin's policy towards Ukraine, but the fact that he is acting as a bully seems not to be in dispute.

An article in yesterday's Guardian started with the have suffered from words ٢r workplace bullying'. The headline was 'Why priests like me are joining trade unions' and the piece was written by an Anglican clergyman. He went on to describe a range of experiences he had suffered, and commented on the increasing number of C of E clergy joining the faith workers' branch of Unite. discussed the isolation felt by also priests when something goes wrong in their ministry and disciplinary or other measures are invoked. Having a supportive trade union seemed to him to be the best means of securing personal support, an idea that was probably anathema to many clergy up to a few years ago.

The Methodist Church has taken a strong stand against bullying behaviour, whoever the alleged perpetrator, publishing advice and guidance and investing in resources that aim to address the issue. The Safeguarding Team have also become more aware in recent years of cases of bullying that may fit the definition of a safeguarding concern but this can lead to some overlap between the various other Church systems designed to tackle things when they go wrong. What's really important though is that these systems work smoothly together to challenge the concerning behaviour and offer restitution and relief to the victim. It's also the case that some people who are the subject of a safeguarding concern will seek support from their trade union if they believe the allegation to be unfair or unfounded, which is another dimension.

The strength of the united response to Russian aggression, that has become evident in the last week, seems to have surprised the Kremlin. So one way of tackling a bully is to be joined up in opposing them. After all, as our training emphasises, safeguarding is all about working in partnership.
