Church Mission Statement of The Drive Methodist Church

Be a good neighbour to the immediate and wider community. Sharing our faith with others through pastoral care, church activities and communication. **Corinthians 13:4–8a** Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends.

Love is the common denominator in how we relate—to God, to others, or to ourselves. As followers of Christ, love is our trademark.

Love is a tricky word. It's most often understood as an intense feeling of deep affection. Biblically, love has a much deeper and richer meaning; it transcends a feeling or emotion. This is what we see in 1 Corinthians 13. Paul tells us that love isn't merely a feeling but a way of relating to others.

While most of us are fairly familiar with 1 Corinthians 13, slowing down to read it empowers us to enjoy subtle beauties we may otherwise miss. In this timeless passage on love, Paul uses poetic symmetry to deepen his point. He lists eight things love embraces and eight things love resists.

In these verses, Paul instructs us about what we need to hold close and what we need to let go. He empowers us with a framework to respond to any situation in love. Sometimes we will need to do things that are out of our comfort zone; sometimes we will need to not do things that feel natural to us. In both situations, love empowers us to respond beyond our feelings so we may impart life to others.

We can begin by putting these into practice with those closest to us, our family. Although as Christians, we don't stop there. As outlined in 1 Corinthians, we're called to love everyone God brings into our lives. We're experiencing extremely anxious and unsettling times and it's easy for fear to take hold and control our thoughts, emotions, and actions. The good news of the Gospel is that we have a remedy for fear—courageous love (<u>1 John 4:18</u>). We have experienced this love personally, and now we have the opportunity to share it with others.

As life returns now quarantines are lifted, and people are able to resume typical schedules, many people are going to need help. Growing debt and poverty are significant concerns and many are in crisis. Children can become vulnerable to neglect and, abuse. What can we do? Be aware, be concerned, show compassion and help in anyway you can. Show your love to others and help them to regain stability.

Father, thank You for the courageous love You've expressed to me through Christ. Thank You for the patience, kindness, and perseverance You embrace me with each day. As I celebrate Your goodness in my life, I pray You would also use me as an instrument of goodness in the lives of others. Open my heart and mind to ways I can demonstrate the love and compassion of Christ to those nearby, in my community, and around the world.

FRANK SAYERS – The Drive's longest-serving organist

Frank and Catherine Sayers were married at The Drive (then Eastern Avenue) Church in 1962. The story he told me was that as soon as they returned from their honeymoon, the Minister, Rev Leonard White, asked him to take over as organist. So the honeymoon was over! Frank remained as organist for the next 33 years, supported by Catherine who sang in the choir. In that time there were a further seven ministers, and the creation of The Drive church in 1973 with the joining together of the Eastern Avenue and Cranbrook Park churches. The first of the major refurbishments of the church buildings took place, and alterations and improvements were made to the organ itself. He worked with Nicholas Foster for many years when Nick ran the choir, and took back that responsibility when Nick moved to Devon.

I had a couple of organ lessons from a friend at university (to date, my only formal training – should I admit that?) and Frank was always very kind in allowing me to practise and even play for some services when I was back for the holidays, and after I left university as well.

As a young organist, I wanted to play all the big, loud pieces, really before I was ready to do so, but Frank was always ready with quiet words of encouragement and advice, never judgemental. He had an almost encyclopaedic knowledge of hymnody, remembering the names of tunes as well as authors. He knew the hymn numbers of most of the hymns in the 1933 *Methodist Hymn Book*, a feat of memory that he had to relearn when *Hymns and Psalms* was introduced in 1983.

A lover of meaningful words in hymns and songs, Frank was not a fan of singing short songs two or three times over. Rev John Beadle knew this, and challenged Frank to write his own extra words, so he added two wonderful verses to Daniel Iverson's *Spirit of the Living God*, which we still use at The Drive to this day.

Arriving at church one Sunday morning, Frank turned to Catherine and said, "Ready for another day of rest, dear?" By 1995, Frank had decided it was time to step back from regular organ-playing duties, and handed over the reins to me. But for many more years, I was grateful to have Frank to deputise for me, and accompany the choir at Christmas and on many other occasions. He also continued to organise the organ and piano tuning.

Musicians do tend to have a bit of an ego – one of the joys of being an organist is the ability to drown out everyone else in the building! But Frank was not like that at all. He was generous with his time, talents, praise and encouragement. He always wanted to thank me at the end of a service and ask about the music I'd played. "We're lucky to have you," he would often say.

Well Frank, we were extremely lucky to have you.

The Collections

On most Sundays a collection is taken up during the service for the work of the church and circuit. This money is used to keep the church going, including building upkeep and repairs as well as staff wages and community work e.g. the Religious Education Resources Project. This project enables local school children to visit churches and find out more about Christianity.

There are many ways that people can give; in cash, by cheque or by bank payment. Many people started paying via their bank during the pandemic and please ask a steward if you'd like to do this. People who want to give regularly can sign up for the yellow envelopes you may have noticed others giving. This also enables you to use the gift aid system if you are a tax payer. Please ask a steward, who will advise you.

During a communion service there are 2 collections; as well as the usual offering there is an opportunity later in the service to offer money for the work of a particular charity. On 1st May this collection will be for Christian Aid and on 5th June for the Church Benevolent Fund.



My favourite part (aside from seeing the finish line) was when I approached St Peter's Square, which is when the sun started to come out. The wintery runs in England didn't prepare me for the warm weather of Rome. Towards the end of the race, the hot sun was beating down as my legs become even more tiresome and heavy. It was tough, especially the last 5km. However, the strength of the Lord kept me going and I am thankful that I was able to cross the finish line in one piece. I finished in 4h 2mins, of which I am very happy and proud. Time will tell if I decide to put myself through this again.

Overall, it was a great experience. Rome is an amazing city, and in some ways the perfect city to do a marathon because of the amazing food on offer.







EVERYDAY PLASTICS

Founded in January 2018 in the UK, Everyday Plastic is a research-led social enterprise which focuses on evidencebased education and campaigns. Through active participation, we teach individuals and organisations the realities of everyday plastic use and how to make a difference.

We work to demystify and simplify what can seem to be an overwhelming problem, providing a personal connection and encouraging everyone to make changes that have a meaningful impact.

We were born out of a unique experiment when Daniel Webb moved to the coastal town of Margate, in 2016, he was appalled by the swathes of plastic littering the beach. This dismay was further compounded as there were no recycling options offered at his new home.

With seemingly no way to dispose of plastic responsibly, Webb decided to conduct an experiment: he would store all of his plastic waste for the entirety of 2017. After 12 months, Webb took the 22 bags of plastic he'd collected and, working with a team of researchers and volunteers, counted, categorised, analysed, weighed, and photographed every single item. Everyday Plastic was born.

A commission for a large installation, called *The Everyday Plastic Mural*, at Dreamland in Margate soon followed, leading to a partnership with scientist and researcher Dr Julie Schneider on the seminal report *What We Throw Away and Where it Goes* (published in October 2018). With interest in the local and global plastic problem exploding, Webb found himself in demand as a public speaker, conducting over 50 talks in 2019 alone. Meanwhile, development began on *The Everyday Plastic Survey*, a nationwide research project with 400 households. Completed in 2020, the survey garnered blanket media attention and prompted a response from DEFRA.

We are a research-led non-profit focused on evidence-based education and campaigns. Through active participation, we help individuals and organisations understand the realities of everyday plastic use and how to make a difference.

We have partnered with <u>Greenpeace</u> to create the **UK's biggest nationwide investigation into household plastic waste.** We want to uncover the truth about how much plastic is passing through our homes and what happens to it.

The **Everyday Plastic Survey** has now evolved into **The Big Plastic Count**, offering every one of us the same chance to discover our household plastic footprint.

With your help, we'll gather new, game-changing evidence that will push the government to take bold action on plastic.

1. Sign up—We'll send you a free pack with everything you need (on recycled paper and plastic-free of course!)

2.- Join thousands across the UK and tally all the plastic packaging you throw away for one week – 16-22 May. Then submit your results on our simple website.

3. We'll give you a personal plastic footprint and reveal what really happens to plastic when it leaves your home. Once all the results are in, we'll share the national picture, and the next steps on pushing the government into action.


Ascension Day May 26th
