As we join together as a nation to celebrate the many and various acts of service made by our Queen, it is good to reflect upon the nature of that service and the example that it provides to us all.

When I think about how I see the Queen go about her acts of service to her nation I am struck by how small each individual act seems and yet together they add up to the job of being the Queen.

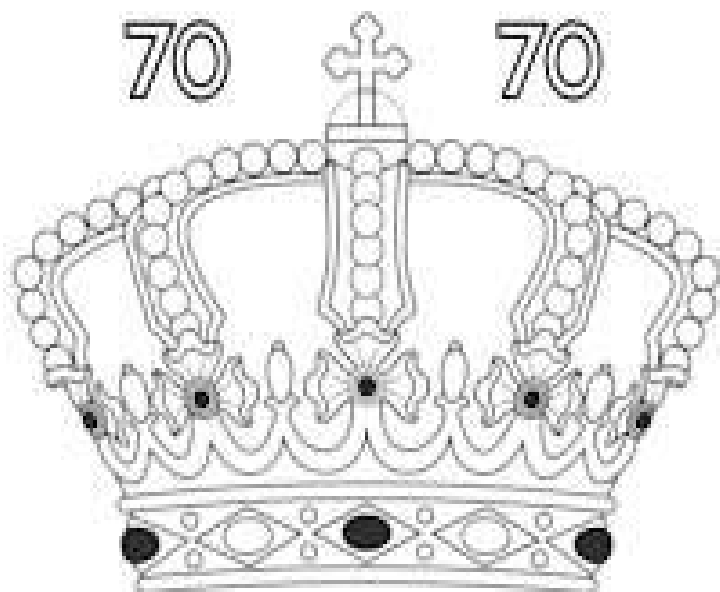

*God save our gracious Queen
Long live our noble Queen, God save the Queen
Send her victorious, happy and glorious
Long to reign over us

The British National Anthem in its present form dates back to the eighteenth century. The words and tune are anonymous, and may date back to the seventeenth century. 'God Save The King' was a patriotic song first publicly performed in London in 1745, which came to be known as the National Anthem at the beginning of the nineteenth century.

In September 1745 the 'Young Pretender' to the British Throne, Prince Charles Edward Stuart, defeated the army of King George II at Prestonpans, near Edinburgh. In a fit of patriotic fervour after news of Prestonpans had reached London, the leader of the band at the Theatre Royal, Drury Lane, arranged 'God Save The King' for performance after a play. It was a tremendous success and was repeated nightly.

This practice soon spread to other theatres, and the custom of greeting monarchs with the song as he or

she entered a place of public entertainment was thus established

There is no authorised version of the National Anthem as the words are a matter of tradition. Additional verses have been added down the years, but these are rarely used.

The words used today are those sung in 1745, substituting 'Queen' for 'King' where appropriate. When 'God Save the King' was adopted in 1745, the lyrics were: *God save great George our king, God save our noble king, God save the king! Send him victorious, Happy and glorious, Long to reign over us, God save the king!*

However, the third and fourth words were soon changed to 'gracious' after they realised that William IV and Victoria's names (who succeeded George IV) didn't scan.

On official occasions, only the first verse is usually sung. The British tune has been used in other countries and European visitors to Britain in the eighteenth century noticed the advantage of a country possessing such a recognised musical symbol.

Nearing the end of the walk, we were treated to a sunset that provided yet another photoshoot as the sky was filled with vibrant pinks, oranges and golden yellows, a wonderful sight to behold.



The third day we went to Monaco and after a busy second day we could feel the ache in our legs but there was still so much we had to see. We exited the station and found ourselves on the famous grand-prix circuit before another little hike to the Prince's palace. Our Friend — Frank Edward Sayers

A special service to celebrate Franks life took place at The Drive on 13th May 2022

Frank wrote this part of the eulogy himself, and the family would like to share it.

I was born in Worthing West Sussex, the third and last child of Walter and Lilian Sayers on November 5th, 1927. My brother Sydney and sister Dorothy were both teenagers when I arrived.

When I was 5 a new Methodist Church was built in our road, and the first minister was The Reverend William Freeman. His wife, Olive called at all the houses in the area to start a Sunday school and so I grew up in Methodism, though my family were not church goers.

The organist at the church taught me to play the organ, as I had previously had piano lessons.

When I left school, I had this strange idea that I would like to be a teacher, though there was no teaching tradition in the family.

After teacher training at the Westminster Methodist teacher training college, I did compulsory National Service for two years.

I enjoyed this and was invited to stay on in the army. However, the Education Officer for Newham recruited those of us who were teachers in civilian life to come to teach in Newham.

I found somewhere to live in Ilford and came to the nearest Methodist church, then called Eastern Avenue Methodist church, later to be The Drive Methodist on amalgamating with the then Cranbrook Park Church.

Here I met my wonderful wife, Catherine. We were married on 14th April 1962, at The Drive. Once we arrived home from our honeymoon the then minister, Leonard White, asked me to be organist and I became organist and choirmaster for over 32 years. The organ, music, and choral singing have always been at the heart of Methodism, and I have thoroughly enjoyed being part of it.

BARKING CHURCHES UNITE

Food collection & Distribution Worker – Job Advert

Barking Churches Unite (BCU) and Dagenham Christians Together (DCT) are looking to recruit a food collection & distribution worker to support the ministry of food provision to the homeless and disadvantaged within the London borough of Barking & Dagenham (LBBD) for up to 20 hours a week for £11.50 per hour.

We work in partnership with LBBD Council from their premises at the Barking Learning Centre (BLC) and Dagenham Library (DL) serving upwards of 150 people per day through our Pit Stop food provision service and 40 – 50 families per week through our community food club's(CFC).

We are looking for a self-motivated individual to support the BCU/BLC/DCT Ministry by collecting from our numerous retail and non-retail partners on a daily basis and having collected, to deliver goods into the BLC / DL in a timely fashion. Being willing to use your own car or van is essential to this role, typical collections can range up to 12 supermarket crates worth of donations. You will have the good interpersonal skills necessary to build and maintain relationships with our existing partner organisations and with new one's as they come on stream.

A mobile phone is essential to the role as all donations are managed through WhatsApp, email and text communications. Key to the role is communication both with supervisory trustee's and partner organisations. You will need to be flexible at all times as donations can be variable both in size and frequency of occurrence and venue for collection

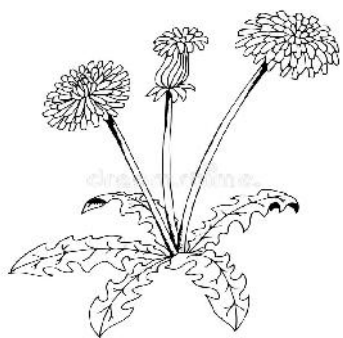

Something completely different is that I am 1 of the first bloomers in spring so I will announce spring / summer for you.

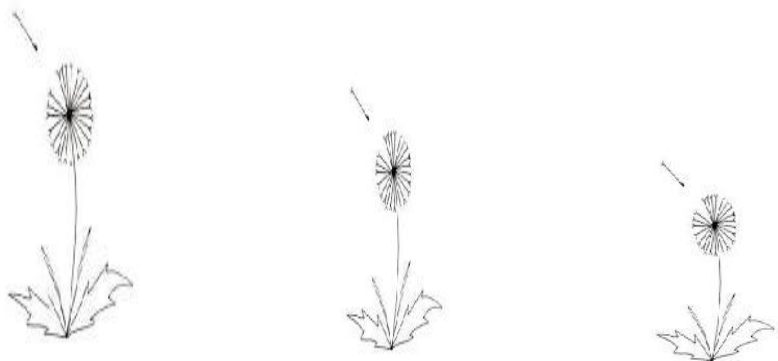
During the day when it's hot, I open my flowers but in the evening when it cools off I close them again quickly. In fact, if it's not hot enough during the day I won't open them at all!

.My flowers are the first food for insects after hibernation and unlike most other plants, I have pollen AND nectar, not merely one OR the other! And I am generous with them!

My flowers are even delicious for you people by the way, did you know?

I used to be called honey (or gold) of the poor because my flowers are so sweet in e.g. jam, sauce or salad! The internet is full of recipes - check them out.

But wait until the end of May or later before you start picking and even then, don't pick everything yet! The biodiversity and bees will be very grateful!"



PENTECOST - 5th June 2022.

The Day of Pentecost marks fifty days since Easter Day and brings the Easter season to an end. It is a major feast of the Church's year when Christians recall how God's Holy Spirit was given to the disciples after Jesus' ascension, empowering them to begin the work of making disciples of all nations.

Pentecost (which comes from the Greek word for 'fiftieth') has its roots in the Jewish Feast of Weeks

Jesus had promised his followers that, although they would not see him after his Ascension, they would receive the Holy Spirit to guide and inspire them.

The Acts of the Apostles describes how the crowds gathered in Jerusalem – representing many nationalities and speaking many languages – were able to hear the disciples preaching in their own language.

The colour most often associated with Pentecost is red, representing the tongues of fire which the Acts of the Apostles describes appearing above the heads of the disciples as a sign that they had received the Holy Spirit.

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting.'

Acts 2, Chapter 2

With its focus on God's Spirit being poured out on believers, Pentecost is one of the most popular days for baptisms and confirmations in the Church's year.

Thy Kingdom Come

Many churches set aside the ten days between Ascension and Pentecost as a special time of prayer for the gift of the Holy Spirit. Thy Kingdom Come – the global wave of prayer established in 2016 following an invitation from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York – has seen millions of Christians across denominations and across the world joining together to pray for more people to come to know Jesus.

Visibility

- Change Eastern Avenue door to be more open (glass) to a more visible area
- Use changeable signage
- Hold more events and invite widely
- Increase communication : social media, printed notices, newsletter, change big notice boards regularly.

Growth

- Social media
- Choir collaboration with others
- Outside preaching to evangelise
- Increase outreach
- Use clearer simpler language
- Create link to sermon content weekly, preachers to be more sensitive/aware of the audience
- More minister led services
- Membership classes
- Support and encourage young people to be active in all aspects of church.

The final session focused on where the circuit is guiding the churches and how we fit into the vision.

MZ outlined the circuit vision day2 resolution going to the June circuit meeting to recommend reducing staff ,to 3 ministers, reducing number of churches, to support and focus on identified circuit priorities.

Closing remarks:

MZ read the following church mission statement as the statement that says who we are as a church:

“The Drive Methodist church aims to be faithful to the commandments of Jesus Christ.

The calling of the Methodist Church is to respond to the gospel of God’s love in Christ and to live out its discipleship in worship and mission, and to fulfil the promises detailed in the Methodist worship book.

Provide a weekly opportunity for all people to worship God in Christ, here at The Drive Methodist Church.

Enable people to grow and learn as Christians through mutual support and care.

Be a good neighbour to the immediate and wider community. Sharing our faith with others through pastoral care, church activities and communication.”

In view of the conversation held we felt that it was important to review the language in the top half of the mission statement to be more easily understood.

The Meeting was closed by sharing the grace together at 12.30 and sharing in a church lunch.
