A Message from Reverend Bernadino

June 2022

To: the congregations of the Barking, Dagenham and Ilford Circuit

Dear Friends

I greet you in name of our Saviour Christ. I am writing to inform you of decisions taken by the Circuit Meeting last week.

After a process of consultation, in which many of you will have participated in your local churches, and some at a Circuit Consultation Workshop that we held at Goodmayes Methodist Church, the Circuit Meeting agreed to accept a recommendation from that process.

The recommendation suggested, was that the Circuit should have three staff members, seven churches, and one or two community centres.

This will enable the Circuit to slim down to its reality and save resources, that can be used for mission instead.

The vote at the meeting was unanimous.

The Circuit also agreed to start implementing the three staff members from September 2023. As a result, when I retire, I will not be replaced.

This action means that the manse which I occupy, will be refurbished as per the quinquennial report at a rough estimate of between £60.000-£80,000 which cannot be done using the Circuit reserves.

With my exit, the Circuit will save at least £50,000, which can be applied to the refurbishment.

I wish the Circuit success as we move into the implementation phase of the vision, and I pray that the Lord will enable all of us to be open to God's working in our Circuit.

MCH, Marylebone Road - the end of an era

On the afternoon of 25th May I attended an event at Methodist Church House to mark the closure of the building at 25 Marylebone Road. Upon arrival we were invited to explore the pilgrimage journey of exhibits, video, photos and stories on each floor.

The afternoon included a worship service celebrating God and the work of MCH. It followed a pilgrimage theme through four stages: The Journey begins, The Pilgrim Path, Holy Encounter and The Next Journey Begins. With hymns and prayers, the service was led by a number of people including the Revd Michaela Youngson, Asst Secretary of the Conference, and at the time of writing, the President and Vice-president of the Conference, the Revd Sonia Hicks and Mrs Barbara Easton. A representative of the staff, mission partners and wider connexion gave their memories. It was a lovely and moving service, and, although sad, a celebration of all the work undertaken at MCH. At the end of the afternoon we were all given an afternoon tea picnic box.

I joined the Connexional Team at MCH in 2001. My first job was as administrator for the editor of *Flame* magazine, Philippa Normanton. When *Flame* ceased publication in 2004 I became administrator to the Revd Micky Youngson in her role as

Secretary for Pastoral Care and Spirituality . When the Team restructured in 2008, I was redeployed as an administrator in the Mission and Advocacy office where I remained until I retired in 2020.

Work on a new mission house in Marylebone Road started in 1939 and the Methodist Missionary Society moved in in 1946 having previously been in Bishopsgate. For a period in World War 2 the BBC also moved in. There were a number of divisional connexional buildings and the decision was taken to restructure all the offices into one Connexional Team. In 1996 the Team (apart from Property) was centralised at 25 Marylebone Road and the building became known as Methodist Church House. With a wide sweeping staircase some of the rooms in the current building have original featured wood from all around the world. The plaques around the bronze front door feature scenes from India, Ceylon, Burma, West Indies and China. Above the door is a frieze made from Portland stone and represents The Fishers of Men designed by David Evans.

On the first floor is a large meeting room, called the Richmond Room, named after the Methodist Training College in Surrey. This room houses four large boards commemorating 125 missionaries who trained at the college, listing their name, place of service, year of entry into the college and year of death.

The first of these missionaries was James H Wayte who, in 1845, volunteered to fill a missionary vacancy in Sierra Leone. He died three months later of a 'violent fever'. Many of the missionaries died prematurely, soon after arriving in their mission station. In the 1850s the most riskiest places to serve were West Africa, West Indies and Honduras. The Richmond College boards made a great impression on German Lutheran pastor and theologian, Bonhoeffer when he visited the college in 1934. He Dietrich would draw attention to the boards to rally the pastors in Germany who were struggling against the state. The Richmond Room also displays a large painting by Henry Perlee Parker showing John Wesley, aged 6, being rescued from a fire at the family home, Epworth Rectory, in 1709. He had a miraculous escape which convinced his mother, Susanna, that her son was a 'brand plucked from the burning'. Also on the first floor is the Chapel displaying lovely stained glass windows. In addition to daily prayers and Holy Communion, the Chapel is always open for staff to use for private prayer. Other meeting rooms in the building are named after past Presidents of Conference, (Thomas) Coke, (Kenneth) Greet, (Kathleen) Richardson, and (Brian) Beck.

I understand that the current team are due to move out later this year and hot desk at the Church of England offices in

Westminster. New offices will then become available at Tavistock Square in 2024. I was so pleased to attend the event and it was lovely to see old colleagues and good friends. I had a lot of fun working at MCH and I miss my time there, not least that sweeping staircase. My friend reminded me of how whenever I came down it I would sing the Strictly Come Dancing theme tune and stop on the landings to wave to the imaginary audience! Happy times!

News from the Religious Education Resources Project Dear Friends,

As I write this I reflect back on the year I have had with the Religious Education Resources Project and it has again been anything but a normal year. Whilst children have been back in school, absences due to Covid 19 have meant that lessons have been altered, timetables changed and the curriculum disrupted. In many cases RE has been put on the back burner whilst other subjects have had extra catch-up time.

Nevertheless we have still been able to offer advice and assistance to those schools who continue to consider RE and in particular the Christian story, as an important part of their curriculum. To date I have spoken to well over 2200 children this year on aspects such as 'what does it mean to be a Christian? and 'the inspiration of Jesus'. I always include as many opportunities for discussion as possible within a session as well as covering the learning objectives suggested by the teachers. As we approach the end of term there are church visits to Barkingside and Seven Kings churches and it is good to see these up and running again.

A new agreed RE syllabus has been launched for Redbridge this year and will be implemented in full next September.

Over the summer I will be looking at this and the changes required to my sessions. I will also be working on the Annual Report which will be issued later in the year. Most importantly I need to understand the correct approach to an ever changing environment in education so that as a Circuit we can continue to be a Christian presence in our local schools.

Thank you for all your prayers and support over this year.

Shirley Erena Murray – hymnwriter

In ten years of using our hymnal *Singing the Faith*, we have sung just over half of the songs in the book at least once. I had a look through my massive spreadsheet to see what we're missing, and came across the 10 hymns by Shirley Erena Murray, none of which we had used. So we sang StF 408 *How small a spark has lit a living fire* back in May on Aldersgate Sunday. There is an interesting article about Shirley, who died in January 2020 in Wellington, New Zealand, on the Singing the Faith Plus website. The following is a small extract; type "Singing the Faith Plus Shirley Erena Murray" into your favourite search engine to find the whole article.

Shirley Erena Murray is one of Singing the Faith's ten most represented authors. She is also the only woman within that group. Neither of these facts is insignificant (her name didn't appear at all in the 1983 UK Methodist hymn book, Hymns & Psalms). Undoubtedly more important to Shirley herself, however, was the fact that her work represents the hymnody and voice of her homeland, New Zealand.

Born in 1931 and raised in a Methodist family, Shirley married a Presbyterian minister, John Murray, and some of her earliest hymns were responses to John's need for an apt text to accompany a particular sermon or service.

The reason why I began to write hymns is... connected to the ethos of being a New Zealander. We have an attitude of 'do it yourself'' – a kind of pioneer spirit which is not intimated by too much tradition and actually welcomes inventiveness. It seemed to me that the hymns we sang had no resonance with the world I lived in... there was no imagery that evoked a particular environment, no landscape of thought to accommodate the southern hemisphere (think of 'In the bleak midwinter' in high summer, for example), no connection with the Maori culture of our society, which is officially bicultural, nothing to articulate our own hopes and visions.

Her hymns and carols address a wide spectrum of themes ranging from the seasons of the Church year to human rights, care of creation, women's concerns and above all, peace. "Creating justice and joy means walking into the territory of basic human rights, as Jesus did. It means being aware of our own fragility as well as our planet's, and using technology wisely."

"I have wanted to move to where Christ consciousness as well as Christian conscience meshes with the world I experience in my own life and time. Almost everything I have written revolves, ultimately, round the concept of 'peace' in all its manifestations." Peace, for Shirley Erena Murray, was a many faceted concept, always tied to justice. It included being at one with our

environment, as well as with other people.

n the end, Shirley's task, as she saw it, was to write hymns that reflected everyday experience, locally, nationally and globally. "I appreciate and relate to precise and clean language," she wrote, "as opposed to flowery and fudgy. I am, in knitting parlance, a plain rather than purl sort of writer. I like language that gives a jolt of reality."

Let's hope we can explore more of Shirley's hymns soon.
