"It was the night before Christmas, when all through the house, not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse..."

These opening lines of the poem taken from the story A visit by St. Nicholas, I first heard on a TV movie where a grandparent had gathered all the grandchildren around a beautifully decorated fireplace, a huge Christmas tree twinkling In a corner and snow falling outside, seen through the window. It created for me a peaceful and beautiful image of Christmas.

Years later, I have come to appreciate how easy it is for many of us to romanticise Christmas; what with all the Christmas movies on tv with everything perfectly falling into place at the right time.

If only it were so in the real world.

The first Christmas, was nothing like the perfect pictures in our minds or on tv. Young Mary (highly pregnant) and Joseph had to travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem for a mandatory census; the town was heaving with people and there was no place for them to stay.

In the night, the pangs of labour begun, and all an inn-keeper could offer them was a dirty and possibly smelly animal shed. We are not told If there were midwives in attendance, yet we know that the child was not clothed in cute baby clothes, but wrapped in swaddling cloth. I can't begin to imagine how Mary felt being far from home. After the visits of the shepherds and the singing bright angels and the Magi's visit; we hear how this young family has to flee to Egypt to escape persecution.

Certainly this is not a warm cosy time.

And this is the story of so many in our world and here in our county as many who are hard hit by lack of income will not have much to be merry about. The many refugees who have had to escape wars or famine in their countries and are finding to place to stay will certainly not be merry. There will be those who once again this will be a lonely time as once more they spend Christmas on their own, or those for whom this will be the first Christmas after a loss of a loved one and there will be an empty seat at the table where that person used to be.

Yet this I know is true... Our Lord Jesus was born into a struggling world and not in a palace, but in a stable, so we

can be assured of a God who shares in and understands our struggles not just at Christmas but in our everyday lives. God is with us!

I am wishing for a merry Christmas where all God's people will extend a hand of generosity to others, by adding an item to the foodbank, giving to charities that offer shelter and food to those without, by inviting a lonely neighbour to feel the warmth of fellowship around our tables.

I wish for a merry Christmas where all of our hope will be renewed in the promise of the coming of Christ as the Prince of Peace, a wonderful councillor and the redeemer of the world.

May all your hearts be filled with joy as you join in the carol singing, as you welcome once more Christ this Christmas, and whether you are travelling or staying in, may you be safe.



Amen.



No one should be living in fuel poverty. We're rallying in London to demand action from this government to keep us all warm this winter!

This winter, 7 million households will be living in fuel poverty. It doesn't have to be this way. Warm This Winter is a campaign made up of some the UK's leading charities, working with community groups, MPs and others, to make sure the government acts to lower energy bills now and in the future.

Join us in Westminster as people share their own experiences of the energy and cost of living crisis, hear from politicians and public figures, and show that we are united in demanding better.


What is a Toy Service?

CAROL OF THE BELLS

If you have seen the 1990 film *Home Alone* or indeed watched any Christmas adverts on the TV in recent years, you will have heard the *Carol of the Bells*, with its famous repetitive four-note motif.

It was only recently that I learned of its origins in Ukraine.

Arranged by composer Mykola Leontovych and first performed in 1916, the music is based on a Ukrainian folk song and was originally conceived as a New Year Song. It gained popularity in the USA, with the English words (*Hark! how the bells*) being added in 1936 by Peter J Wilhousky. The original choir version has been rearranged several times over the years for various combinations of singers and instrumentalists.

If you want to hear a live rendition of *Carol of the Bells*, come to our Carol Service in church at 6:30pm on Sunday 18 December (you'll have time to watch England win the World Cup before you come to church in the evening!). Given the current circumstances in Ukraine, it seems appropriate to include it this year.

My Most Memorable Christmas

It took place about mid December about 30 years ago when my Mum suddenly went into a diabetic coma although she was an undiagnosed diabetic. She had been poorly with an infection for a week for which the GP gave her antibiotics & she seemed to be getting better but suddenly took a turn for the worse.

On the Saturday evening, having slept for most of the day, we suddenly realised that she wasn't responding to what we were saying so called the GP who called an ambulance & she was rushed into hospital in Barking, where they worked on her for 3 hours and at midnight, a doctor told us she was in a diabetic coma and probably wouldn't survive the night, but if she did, she would probably have severe brain damage.

A normal blood sugar level is between 4 – 9 and hers was 37!! Dad sat with her and I called the family to come immediately. She survived the night, the family arrived and we sorted out a rota for them to be with her and keep talking.

One evening when she had been in a coma for about 2 days, my sisters and I were sitting around her bed and chatting when one said she couldn't remember Mum & Dad ever arguing.

I said I did as I lived closer & told them about the occasion when they "had words" whether the fish pond in the garden should stay as it was (Dad's preference) or change into a rockery (Mum's preference). Mum finally pulled rank and said "Stanley, (it was always his full name when she wanted her way) that is going to be a rockery, even if you have to be underneath it"

We all laughed and Mum joined in with the laughter, even though she was in a coma! I said "You can hear me, can't you? So, to check, I think you know one of the things I've inherited from you is incredibly ticklish feet so I'm going to tickle your feet. I walked my hands down the bed towards her feet and as I got closer, she moved her feet away!!

She came out of the coma 3 days later with no brain damage and was in hospital for a month including Christmas. We all felt it was such a miracle that she had come though this that we decided this was going to be her Christmas.

Given that we were all spending so much time at the hospital, no-one had time to get any gifts, so we agreed to just give presents to Mum on Christmas Day, no-one else, just her!!

She was with us for another 5 years before we lost her 25 years ago but those years were a wonderful bonus. You don't always appreciate what you have until you come so close to losing it, do you?



It was with great sadness, although not unexpected, that I learnt at the Church Council on 9th November that the Drive Scout and Guide Group had ceased to exist with the closure of the last surviving section, The Cub Pack.

Having joined the cubs 80 years ago and been involved with the Group for a large part on my life, as a member, an Assistant Scout Leader, Scout Leader, Group Scout Leader, Chairman of Group Executive and, since I handed my warrant, Group Life President. It feels strange being a Life President of a non-existent Scout and Guide Group.

The fact that the Group kept going for all those years, is largely due to the long, loyal, and dedicated service of a few leaders. The Scouts and Cubs have, over the years, been served by, John and Audrey Taylor, Jeremy and Diane Foster, Mike Seviour, Colin Runeckles, Peter and Lorraine Bendon, Ian Warden and, over several years my wife Pat. John Higgins has also been a non-uniformed helper for 15 years.

The Guides and Brownies long term leaders include Anne Warden, Jo Wright, Sandra Runeckles, Barbara Nacarro, Kaye Mawson (now Merrywest), Rosemary Smith, Anne Dellow and Pam Murphy.

We have also had many other leaders for shorter periods of time, too many to mention but for whom we are so grateful for their help in maintaining the group and giving a great induction to Scouting and Guiding to hundreds of young people who have passed through the Group.

There are also many other people involved with the Group in a non-uniformed capacity. Peter Foster was Group Chairman, then Treasurer for many years after Bert Runeckles took over as Group Chairman. Our current Group Secretary, who is still active in helping deal with the closing of the Group, Andy Marriott, has been with us for 20 years.

We also had, for several years, a catering committee which organised our Annual General Meeting dinners for a few years where we entertained and fed around 80 people.

The Scouts and Guides were formed at the Church in 1928 so we have not quite made our !00th Anniversary.
