The new season starts with snowdrops in the Gardens. We plan to be open for two Sunday Snowdrop Open Days, on 12 and 19 February 2023, weather and ground conditions permitting.

The Gardens will be open from 11.00 to 4.00, last entry 3.00. Snowdrops in the green available to purchase and there will be a plant stall. Other stalls tbc.

Our volunteers will provide hot and cold refreshments, including bacon, cheese or hummus rolls, homemade soup and homemade cakes.

Tickets will be available in advance through Trybooking.com or on the gate from 12.00pm.

CHRISTMAS PAST— recollections from Janet Brunnen.

I have been going back in time to Christmas's as a child. When I was little we had a stocking on Christmas Eve; a white mesh net stocking. There was always a tangerine and a walnut in the toe of the stocking.

Other presents were pencils, crayons, a magic painting book, and maybe a pencil case. One year my Nan gave me a very pretty blue tin, decorated with pink flowers. Inside were assorted biscuits. I thought it was wonderful. I still have the tin to this day.

Mum bought me a book called Christmas at Timothy's and I've still got it! We didn't have many presents as there was little money and choice.

I used to make paper chains with paste made from flour and water to hold them together. I also collected green leaves and glued glitter on them.

In the late forties, early fifties when rationing was still in place ,we couldn't get real Christmas trees but mum had a small silver artificial one.

Turkeys weren't available and so we had chicken for Christmas dinner. At tea time it was cold meat and pickle as Nan used to make pickled red cabbage, fruit cake and trifle. On Christmas Day I think there was my Mum and Dad, Nan, me and my two sisters and my Aunt and Uncle.

My Dad was one of fourteen and Mum was an only child and on Boxing Day Aunts and Uncles came to tea.more trifle, cake, celery, cold meat, pickles and bread and butter.

Mum used to make my sister Mary and I do a little play. We sang " its dark in the earth today, said one little bulb to the other" I recall that we were dressed in green crepe paper costumes. The song was from the Carrie Bonner Sunday School book.

And here is Janet and Marys Christmas party piece.....

"It's rather dark in the earth today,"

She would often laugh that the alto line only had one or two monotonous notes to sing, but without Hilary and Michelle singing those notes, the music would not have been so harmonious and joyous.

Over the years Hilary has written many wonderful, heartfelt prayers and I'm sure all of us have been uplifted and blessed by them at some point in our lives. I feel truly lucky that Hilary was part of my church family, an anchor in stormy times, a calm reassuring voice, a fellow cat lover and a wonderful, supportive friend.

My earliest memories of Hilary were as a JMA collector in my extreme youth. She was one of my regular contributors! (I still have the medal somewhere...)

And I don't remember a time when Hilary wasn't singing in the choir. Others won't mind me saying that she was a mainstay of the alto section, with her music-reading ability and confident singing voice.

Hilary was fiercely independent. She continued working well past retirement age. To my knowledge, she never applied for a bus pass, despite travelling to work and everywhere else by bus – she would always have a story about the interesting people and incidents she'd come across on her bus travels. It was only in later years that she would accept a lift home from choir practice. She had a soft spot for Anglican worship, and was a regular visitor to Christchurch, Wanstead and St John's, Stratford, as well as our neighbours at St Andrew's.


Hilary could be very direct – she would let me know if she didn't think my socks matched the shirt I was wearing! But she was equally supportive and generous with her praise, often enjoying and asking about the organ music at the end of a service. She was very open to new music in church, and was often more familiar than me with recent worship songs, because of her visits to other churches.

Hilary was essentially a private person. We all knew her, but in many ways we probably didn't. I never knew how old she was. She did let us in on some of her views, for example she was definitely not a royalist! But her character showed through best in the many prayers that she wrote, which were more conversations with God, often very specific to the news at the time they were written.

We've continued to hear her voice throughout December in the prayers that she prepared to share on the WhatsApp group, finishing just before Christmas with a beautifully concise reminder of Jesus as the light of the world.

It's still difficult to believe that I won't see her standing at the bus stop on the Eastern Avenue, and that she won't be waiting in the choir vestry to criticise my choice of socks. We will miss her.

When I joined the choir in 1986, she was already there, a committed and loyal choir member. She had a lovely strong alto voice and we missed her very much at our recent Carol Service.

Hilary was always prepared to take on any task within the church. When I became a steward for the first time in the early 90s, Hilary was already there on the team. She went on to become the senior steward and remained so, very efficiently, for some years. She had also been the secretary for The Church Life and Finance Committees. In recent years she agreed to join the steward's team again. Since assisting Michelle with the senior steward's role, I knew I could always count on Hilary to be happy to read service lessons. And she wasn't bothered which reading – "just tell me on the day" she used to say to me. She was also happy to volunteer to steward at weddings and

funerals.

And of course we all know of Hilary's beautiful prayer writing through which her Christian faith shone. Whenever she was on vestry duty, she would always write her own prayer to read in the vestry for the preacher and choir before the service began. Her words always hit the right note. In fact when Stephen Normanton was our minister, he would ask Hilary to repeat the prayer in church so that the congregation could hear it as well. Many times she had taken part in a service leading her own prayers of intercessions. She was modest about receiving praise for her prayer writing. When I worked at MCH and the annual Methodist Prayer Handbook was being put together, I always used to suggest to Hilary that she submit a prayer but she used to shrug and shake her head and never did.

Hilary was a very generous person and I was always grateful for her support of our annual JMA Beetle Drive to which she always gave a donation and enjoyed taking part in. I will miss her at the planned event for 2023.

Hilary was not one for modern technology and never owned a mobile phone or computer. She did however have a

television. Chatting to her recently while we were stewarding at a wedding, the conversation turned to TV programmes and in particular Strictly Come Dancing which she loved to watch. The new series had just started and we had a great time discussing the potential



dancing abilities of the celebrity contestants. Earlier this year, when Jeremy asked her if we were to hold a slides evening on a Saturday in November, would she attend? For as long as I can remember she was always at church fulfilling her duties with care and concern. Such was her diligence that she would quietly step in to undertake any task that would appear to be needed last minute. She was a valued member of the choir and in recent months we occasionally managed to have a brief chat before making our way home.

There was never time for an in depth conversation and I rather think that she preferred it that way but she never failed to ask after my family or praise my efforts at flower arranging. I wonder if she knew how much confidence she instilled in me over the years? I used to thank her profusely.

Hilary was gifted in her ability to write the most beautiful prayers, one of which was posted on, The Drive Together on the 1st December.

Forgive us that we sometime bring more darkness than light.


If we are to be the light of the world, we need to immerse ourselves in your light, so it overflows through us to others.

This makes the RERP the only local faith group providing these tailor- made visits for special needs children which have been identified as a focus in the new RE curriculum.

There were disappointments too as the icy weather called a halt to the planned school concert at Barkingside Methodist. In addition a church visit and separate in-school assemblies cancelled last minute by a school due to their own disorganization. However much I would like there to be no hiccups it is clear that relationships with schools are complex and ever changing.

Within schools the early spring term now approaching is a time to press ahead with the curriculum and a great deal of the year's learning happens within this term. I already have in-school visits booked and some church visits too. I hope they will go ahead according to plan. It has been encouraging that some of the appointments which were unable to go ahead last year have now been rebooked and I am looking forward to them.

THE YEAR OF THE RABBIT

The Chinese New Year 2023 falls on Sunday, January 22nd, 2023, and celebrations culminate with the Lantern Festival on February 5th, 2023.

Celebrations last up to 16 days, but only the first 7 days are considered a public holiday (January 22nd–January 29th, 2023).

Chinese New Year marks the transition between zodiac signs: 2023 is the Year of the Rabbit; 2022 was the Year of the Tiger.

JAN 14TH-21ST Little Year

Preparations for the new year begin on January 14th, 2023, and last until New Years Eve.

JANUARY 22ND-FEB 1ST **Spring Festival**

Chinese New Year officially begins on January 22nd, 2023, and ends on February 1st.

FEB 2ND-5TH Lantern Festival

Preparations begin the 2nd, and the Lantern Festival is held on February 5th.



Giving gifts to loved ones is an important part of celebrating the Chinese New Year.

It is a time to come together with family to celebrate the end of the previous year and the start of the new year, with gift-giving being one of the many traditions followed during this

time. Senior family members will give gifts to younger members of the family, younger members will give gifts to them in return, and hosts may also be given gifts as a thank you for holding the celebrations.

Red Packets

Red packets, also known as hongbao, are one of the most well-known Chines New Year gifts. Monetary gifts are placed in red envelopes to be given to family, friends and colleagues, though traditionally they were given from the older generation to the younger generation.

New, clean and crisp banknotes are given to carry blessings, prosperity and good luck for the year ahead. The red envelopes are given and received using both hands, and it is courteous not to open them in the presence of the present-giver.

With the advent of the internet era, sending red packets online has become a modern New Year's custom during the Spring Festival.
