**The Methodist Church Statement and Prayer
on the first anniversary of the war in Ukraine**

For the past year we have been horrified by the scale of the violence in Ukraine. Russia's invasion failed to depose the legitimately elected government in Ukraine. Tragically, it has been responsible for tens of thousands of deaths of Ukrainians and Russians, both civilians and military.

Atrocities have been committed that will leave physical and mental scars on those living in Ukraine's war zones and no doubt on perpetrators as well. Our hearts go out to those who have lost loved ones, those whose lives and dreams have been destroyed, families that have been separated and all those who have sought sanctuary in another country.

Our churches have worked with the government to help shape the Homes for Ukraine scheme. Over 150,000 people have sought shelter in the UK. Our church members are well represented among the many who have provided accommodation, while many local churches have provided further support.

Sadly still more people are being forced out of Ukraine today. Only an end to the conflict can provide the relief that the people of Ukraine so desperately need. Our prayers are for the people of both Ukraine and Russia, for peace and justice, and for an outcome that ensures the future security of all in the region.

REDBRIDGE Teen Challenge London Re-Use Centre

A good cause to donate your unwanted household items to help others. Collection service available.

TCL Reuse was set up in 2016 with the help of the Lighthouse Furniture Project based in Brentwood, Essex. Their partnership helped us establish a good working model on which to expand on. In 2018 TCL Reuse became self-sufficient and began operating as an independent charity in which all profits are used to support Teen Challenge London, a street outreach and drug & alcohol rehabilitation ministry.

We are a registered charity and as a used furniture store we provide furniture to those on low income at significantly reduced prices and in some instances for free. We work with a wide variety of agencies and seek to help those who are struggling to help themselves. We also are able to offer a variety of City & Guilds training courses as well as employment opportunities to those going through rehabilitation.

Our goal is to re-use and then up-cycle, not recycle, but we do ensure that anything we can't reuse is recycled if possible. Many of the items donated to us would have gone to a landfill if they had not come to us.

With our Street Outreach Food Programme, we support work to distribute nearly 20,000 meals every year to those on the streets, six evenings a week.

We support daytime drop-in centres situated within churches. This follows on from the street outreach food programme. Drop-in not only focusses on providing free meals but also giving those on the streets a chance to talk and information about the different options available to help a specific need.

We support a 28-bed residential rehabilitation programme situated in Ilford, for men aged 18 to 60 years suffering from addiction. It also provides City & Guilds training courses for the men on the programme.

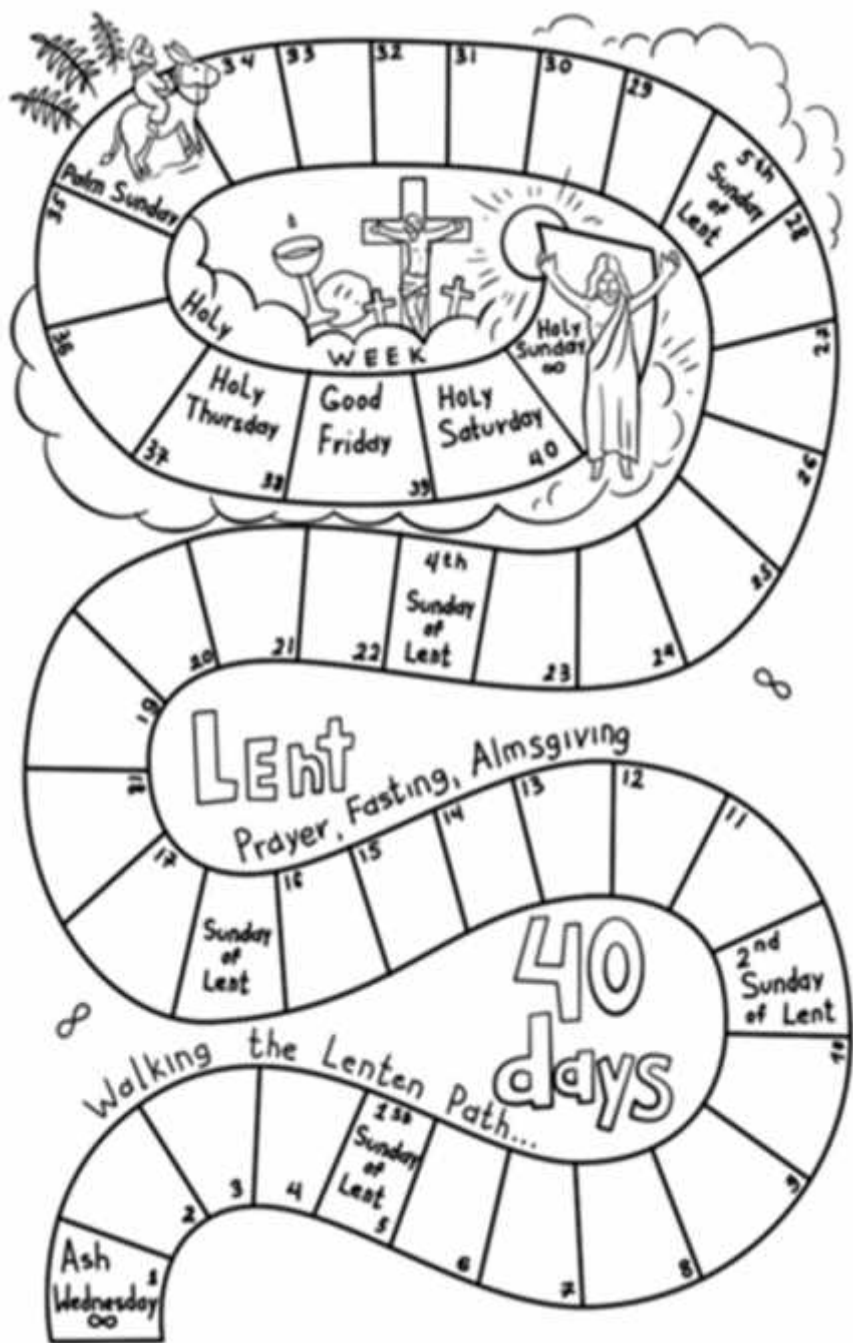

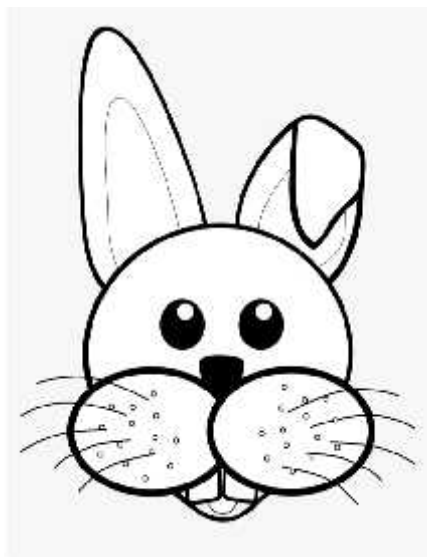

Loving God,

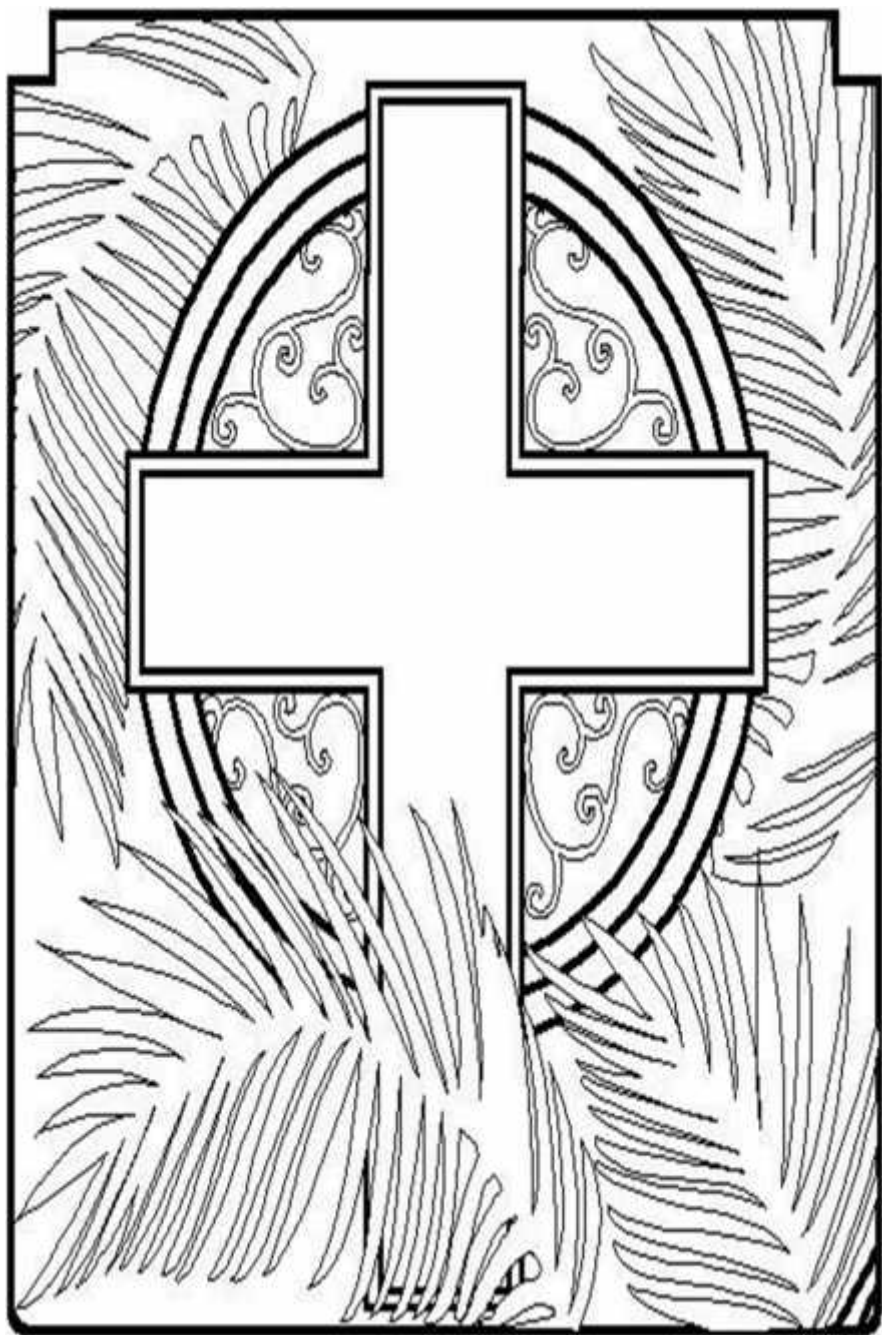
*I pray for my prayer life to become

Yearly membership is available but visitors are always welcome to join us for a small fee of £7

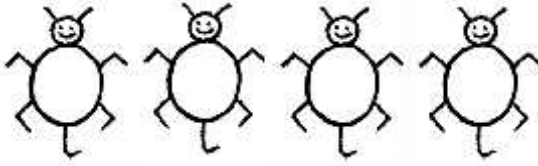
Some of our club members are keen flower arrangers and attend workshops competitions other local flower clubs as well as flower festivals and events.

Here's a memory from John Higgins

When the Scout Group meeting at The Drive was in full swing, the appeal was sent out asking for volunteer helpers to assist with the running of the Group. As a teenager I had joined the Air Training Corp (ATC), so I knew nothing about Scouting, so I thought it might be interesting to get involved. Well it was certainly interesting because I was involved for 15 years. Proving that it is never too late to learn.

Jeremy and Mike ran the Group, with planning meetings at the start of each term. Apart from the normal activities, we always tried to include something different. This included visits to the local Fire Station, Ambulance Museum, Police garage, canoes at Fairlop Waters, climbing/archery/shooting/zip wire at Gilwell Park. On other occasions we went to Lambourne End and tried to ambush the other half of the group in the dark.

Normal activities at The Drive included cooking, first aid, map reading, games. One particular game I remember was 'Lighthouse', with the keeper sitting with a bucket on his head and torch in hand, trying to detect invaders.

Other activities were raft making and sailing them on the Roding. Making model aircraft and flying them in the Hall. Making go-karts and racing them around the Hall. More ambitious projects were making electrical lighting with fond memories circuits and soldering copper pipes All these you will say were normal Scout activities, but for me they were new things that I had not done as a group activity.

During my years with the ATC I learnt how to reassemble a Bren gun, aeronautics and meteorology. Even flew a training 'plane. The difference though was that the ATC trained young people to be servicemen and women of the future, while the Scout and Guide Movement gave young boys and girls essential skills and confidence building for later life.

During her time with the Guides, my daughter Lindsey went to Portugal and Ukraine on international events.

Sadly we have come to the end of an era at The Drive. However I am sure that all the leaders and helpers over the years will look back, and remember with fond memories all the young people they met.

The drop-in is located at the Fullwell Cross Library on the last Monday of each month, so the next one will be 27th February 2023 2-6pm, followed by further sessions on:

27 March 2pm-6pm and 24 April 2pm-6pm

DI Umer Iqbal from the East Area (Redbridge, Havering Barking and Dagenham) is leading the Victim Advisory Working Group (VAWG) for female victims of crime in the East Area (Redbridge, Havering Barking and Dagenham).

The working group takes place quarterly across different locations in order to engage with as many people as possible. The next meeting is on Wednesday 8th March between 12-2pm at Romford Town Hall.

Sweets of open laughter.

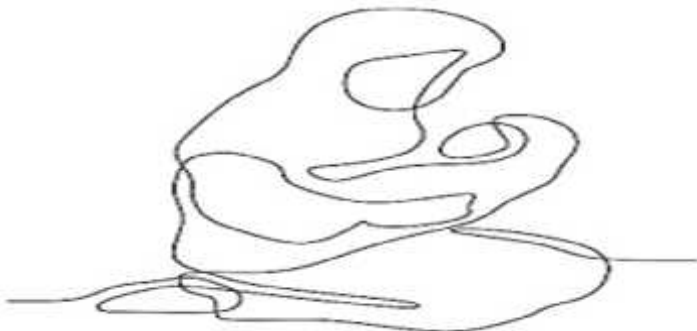
I loved you even during the years

News from the Religious Education Resources Project

My Dear Friends,

As I now complete more face to face visits in classrooms I am again reminded of the importance of being relevant to children at the appropriate ages and that many schools have not yet recovered from lockdown also that there is less knowledge about the Christian story.

One class of 7 yr olds may not have the same understanding as another class. One class may have the words to express themselves whilst others struggle. This means that when I enter a classroom, I first have to find out the abilities of the children and then introduce the vocabulary we need before even thinking about the Christian topic I have been asked to teach, or the discussion the schools require with the practical ideas the Project aims to provide for the teachers.

Mostly this is all fitted into the 30 minutes made available to me to visit each group. This week I visited a class of 6 yr olds who used registration time to also do 3 minutes of keep fit and in addition learn the oceans of the world, this was, I add, also some of the time which had been allotted for my session.

So learning has to be precise, to the point and relevant, now more than ever. I was reminded of this during a recent school visit to Gantshill Methodist. 'What's that?' asked a child pointing to the projector on the wall. I said what it was then what it did but neither explanation was understood. A teacher said that the children did not know what projection was, it was old tech. Of course why would they as all classrooms had flat TV screens on the wall now, wise teachers had a flip chart standing by for when the tech did not work.

Over the next few weeks there will be more face to face sessions as well as church visits. It is encouraging that The Drive is being used again for these, despite problems securing a booking for the visit. There are others in the pipeline. I pray that I will be able to pitch these sessions correctly for the children in their ever changing understanding of the world which continues to gather pace.

Thank you all for your support and prayers in this work.
