

Tributes to Josie

I'm so sad that I have to say 'goodbye' to my dear friend Josie, who I have known for what seems like forever.

I first met her well over 40 years ago when my children and I returned to live in Redbridge and came back to the Church.

She approached me about helping in the Church crèche which she organised and we spent many hours putting the world to rights while looking after the little ones. Our friendship continued as our lives progressed with me travelling to visit my children after they moved abroad and by that time, she had slowed down and life was a lot quieter.

Through it all, she was always really interested about where I had been and what I had been doing. Our in-depth chats continued over tea at her home and progressed to us debating various news items. Politics, snooker (with special affection for local boy, Ronnie O'Sullivan, who she knew as a child), no subject was off limits and she had an opinion on everything.

During one of those visits and while I was doing my handicraft, she said "I really envy you doing that, I used to love knitting but I can't follow a pattern these days" to which I said "if you want to knit, why don't you knit squares which I could make into a blanket". She said OK and, before she had time to think about it, I supplied her with wool and needles. We agreed on a size and she turned into a woman possessed, a virtual knitting machine! She chose the wool, the design and between us, we created a lovely blanket which she ultimately gave to Priya's Mum, Christine as a house-warming present.

The squares which kept appearing by the hundreds turned into baby blankets for Sandra Runeckles to take to the special baby unit at Newham General Hospital where she worked as a midwife.

Josie was ageless and full of fun, loved her family and meeting new people, would never say a bad word about anyone (unless he was a politician!!) and cared about everyone. She was especially proud of the young ones at church who she thought of as her babies from their time in her crèche.

Life had become a struggle since she broke her leg a couple of years ago. However, she bravely confronted her fear of hospitals by agreeing to surgery and rehab in order to return to her own home and, with the fantastic support of her son, Colin, who arranged everything, is where she remained until she left us.

During one of our most recent chats, I asked her about her favourite song which she surprised me by saying was John Lennon's "Imagine". When I asked her why, she said that the words were what she prayed for every night. Words like:

Josie is now at peace and I'm so grateful to have been her friend and will be carrying on her prayer for a kinder, more caring world.

This meant that when a new baby arrived, I would visit the family at home to take an interest in them and as Cradle Roll secretary I would present the parents with a Baptismal Candle at the Christening where during the service, I would have to say 6 words. I always found it incredibly daunting when it was time to speak. I used to visit the parents after the Christening and I remember visiting Priya when Rochelle was tiny which was delightful. I enjoyed my involvement with the children but was happy to hand over the role to Janet Wragg when the time came.

Church Covenant Service and Communion

7th January 11.15am

No Ordinary Promise

An opportunity to start the New Year remembering God's promises to us and how we might respond.

What is a Covenant?

What God offers is a loving relationship. The Covenant is not a contract in which God and human beings agree to provide particular goods and services for each other! It is not something that we have to do to create a relationship with God. God has freely and graciously already made it possible.

Rather, the Covenant is the means of grace by which we accept the relationship and then seek to sustain it. It is therefore not so much about getting in to a relationship with God as it is about staying in it. It is not about acquiring a relationship with God, but living within the loving relationship that God has already offered us.

God's gracious offer to us is therefore simultaneously a challenge. If God is committed to us, are we prepared to accept that as reality and commit ourselves in return to God? Even if we do choose to accept it, how can we manage to live out our commitment adequately, frail and human as we are?

The Covenant Renewal Service, or simply called the Covenant Service, was adapted by John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, for the purpose of the renewal of the Christian believer's covenant with God.

The feast of the Epiphany, marked on 6 January, has become associated in the West with the arrival of three "wise men" – the magi – in Bethlehem (left, in a mosaic from the church of Saint Apollinare Nuovo, Ravenna). It's a story that only the gospel writer Matthew tells (Matthew 2: 1-12).

However, Epiphany originally commemorated Jesus' baptism (e.g. Luke 3: 15-17, 21-22) and the occasion on which he miraculously turned water into wine at the wedding in Cana (John 2: 1-12). Other events associated with Epiphany were the presentation of Jesus at the temple (see Marking Candlemas) and the actual birth of Jesus itself. The visit of the Magi was in fact a later addition to the celebration.



The word "epiphany" comes from a Greek word meaning "manifestation". We're talking here about a manifestation (or manifestations) of God. In Hebrew tradition, one of the most memorable epiphanies was Moses' experience of God in a burning bush (Exodus 3:2). In these stories from the gospels, we are being told that all we need to know about God is present in the person and actions of Jesus.

First, that the magi "from the East" are Gentiles. They come from out with the Jewish tradition and do not know of the scriptural prophecies concerning the location of the Messiah's birth (Matthew 2: 2-6). Already, at this very early stage in the story of Jesus, we are invited to understand that God's love reaches beyond traditional boundaries to people who are not part of our own community.

Secondly, if our understanding of Epiphany includes not only the conclusion of the wise men's two-year trek to a stable in Bethlehem but also the baptism of Jesus and his first miracle at Cana, then perhaps we are reminded that Epiphany is not the end of a journey; it's only the beginning.

Methodist Church

This is a copy of the recent Reflection read by Jeremy Foster.

Based on a reflection by Raj Nadella – Associate Professor of New Testament Studies (Columbia Theological Seminary)

Just imagine an angel showing up at your home or workplace entirely unexpectedly and making a life-altering announcement. Luke tells two such stories in a short section of the Bible and juxtaposes them. Since the story of angel Gabriel announcing the birth of Jesus to Mary comes on the heels of the account of Zechariah's own encounter with an Angel, it is hard not to compare the two stories.

Mary and Zechariah respond to the angel's announcements in vastly different ways. Unlike Zechariah, Mary's final response to Gabriel's announcement was one of complete affirmation. Mary's response of "may it happen to me as you have said" is similar to Jesus' prayer on the Mount of Olives before his death when he says "your will, not mine". It is a declaration of trust in God even as Mary, and later Jesus, were going into the unknown.

But initially, when angel Gabriel showed up at Mary's door and announced that she was "highly favoured and that the Lord was with her", her response was very different. Luke tells us that she was "greatly troubled" by the unanticipated visitor and the announcement that seemed to come out of nowhere.

In describing Zechariah's reaction to the angel, Luke says that "he was alarmed and felt afraid" and he challenged the angel saying "How shall I know if this is so. I am an old man and my wife is old also?" His disbelief resulted in him becoming unable to speak. Mary though had every reason to be "deeply troubled" by a stranger showing up at her door and making a grand but vague announcement. She was certainly in a much more delicate situation than Zechariah who had status as a Priest in the Temple. Mary was among the most powerless in society: young, female and poor. The stakes were indeed very high for Mary. One wrong move could ruin her personal and family reputation and jeopardise her entire life.

In the end, Mary's story stands out for the impressive transformation from her initial response of being "deeply troubled" to a query about how this might be possible, to a final affirmation of the announcement. The story also stands out for what really brought about this transformation in Mary's response to the angel and helped her embrace the announcement.

When Mary seemed deeply troubled, Gabriel first sought to reassure her and convince her to embrace her vital role as mother to be by presenting her with seven significant pronouncements. These are: "You are highly favoured. The Lord is with you. You will give birth to a son. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David. He will reign over Jacob's descendants forever. His kingdom will never end."

Gabriel's suggestion that God will give him the throne of David is a reference to our Samuel reading where the Lord declares to David that a royal line will be established for him with the words "I will make one of your sons king and will make sure his dynasty continues for ever". Gabriel highlights that Jesus would be in the line of royals descended from David.

The angel also uses the title "the Son of God," which was a multi layered and highly political title. Whilst "Son of God" was a theological term that called attention to Jesus' relationship with God as the beloved son, one that would be formally announced later at the baptism by the voice from heaven; the term "Son of God" was also a political title as it was a term used in the Roman Empire to refer to Augustus Caesar, the adoptive son of Julius Caesar.

Gabriel made the seven pronouncements to Mary in a matter of minutes. But there was a long history in those titles, and they should have made Mary absolutely joyful. Interestingly, despite their significance none of those seven pronouncements really reassured her or helped her get over her anxiety - she still had questions about it.

"I am a virgin - how can this be?" Mary asks. In language similar to the transfiguration story, angel Gabriel responds saying "the holy spirit will come on you and God's power will rest upon you. For this reason the holy child will be called the Son of God". It is a strong assurance, including the promise that her offspring will be called Son of God. But apparently, even that doesn't do it for Mary either.

In the end, it was the news that Elizabeth had also conceived in a miraculous manner, despite her advanced age that convinced Mary to accept the announcement. She asked no additional questions after that. It was the assurance that another woman, someone she knew well, would walk with her during this uncertain journey that convinced Mary. Indeed Elizabeth likely understood Mary's predicament more than anyone else, and it was the prospect of a shared experience that mattered to Mary more than any of those grand promises from Gabriel.

Whilst Zechariah, a priest and a person of privilege, loses his ability to speak because of his unwillingness to believe the angel's proclamation about John's birth, Mary in contrast, a person of low social and economic status, is celebrated and exalted given her positive response of "I am the Lord's servant" to Gabriel's announcement. Mary ponders, asks thoughtful questions, and responds in a mature manner. Mary was not a leader like Zechariah but emerges as one during the course of this story. While Zechariah is silenced because of his response, Mary gets to sing about the coming mission of Jesus.

For people at the margins facing difficult situations, what matters most is someone who will share in their experience, stand with them, and walk with them. That's also the story of the incarnation in our Bible readings. Not simple assurances that God cares for us but the fact that God will share in the human experience and journey with us in our everyday lives.

SAFEGUARDING

Does E2EE pose a danger to my child? E2EE is being introduced by social media companies to enhance privacy for their users – but if this is done without putting the necessary child safety measures in place, it could pose a risk.

At the moment, social media companies scan their platforms to find and report child sexual abuse material (such as images, videos, and grooming conversations) to law enforcement, so that abusers are arrested, and children are protected.

If E2EE is rolled out widely without necessary child safety measures, social media companies will no longer be able to find and report child sexual abuse material in the same way. It will make it harder for social media companies and law enforcement to detect child sex abusers who are looking to manipulate, groom, and sexually abuse potential victims. Crucially, it will mean that social media companies will be unable to detect and prevent the spread of images and videos of child sexual abuse within encrypted messaging services.

Always be aware of your child's activity on their devices. Make a safety agreement that you openly talk about their use.

Explain why this is necessary.
